Commander Richard R. Brydges USN (Ret.), passed away on 28 April 2021 at the age of 76 after a 5-year battle with head and neck cancer and complications from Parkinson's disease. Rick attended elementary schools in Grosse Pointe, MI, and graduated from Grosse Pointe High School in 1962. He entered the United States Naval Academy in 1963 from the New Mexico Military Institute as a Navy football recruit. A gifted athlete, Rick played football and tennis and graduated in June 1967. After graduation and flight school he deployed with the VA-82 "Marauders" flying combat missions in the A-7 Corsair II aircraft in the Tonkin Gulf.

Rick then attended Naval Postgraduate School in Monterrey, CA, where he earned a designation in weapons system acquisitions management. Following 25 years in the Navy, Commander Brydges attended the University of San Diego, where he met his wife Carolyn Salerno and earned his doctorate in Organizational Development and Leadership. Additionally, he served as Vice-President of the Advancement of Leadership organization to support the practice of Democracy through collaborative leadership.

Rick is survived by his daughters, Kelly and Megan, his son Brooks, and six beloved grandchildren. In addition, he is survived by his wife Carolyn and her two grandchildren. Rick served as President of the Parkinson's Association and was a Board member for many years. He was highly dedicated to the Parkinson's community, constantly striving and encouraging others to promote living lives well with Parkinson's Disease. A Catholic Funeral Mass was heard at St. Thomas More Catholic Church in Oceanside, CA, on 16 June 2021 followed by interment at Miramar National Cemetery on 21 June 2021.

Commander Elden L. Ploof, USN (Ret.), 79, of Ocala, FL, passed away on 6 April 2021, comforted and surrounded by his loving family.

Elden was born in Fargo, ND, to Rebecca and Elden Ploof on 30 December 1942. After graduating from Fargo High School, he attended Pillsbury Military Academy and graduated from the Naval Academy with the Class of 1965.

His Navy career included: NABTC Pensacola

(June 1965-August 1966); VT-28 Corpus Christi (August-December 1966); VT-2 NAS Whiting Field as a flight instructor (December 1966-June 1968); VXN-8 NAS Patuxent River (June 1968-May 1970); VT-2 NAS Whiting (May-November 1970); NASC Pensacola, where he also attended University of Pensacola and obtained his master's degree (November 1970-December 1972); V-30 NAS Patuxent River (December 1972-May 1973); VP-26 Brunswick (May 1973-June 1975); Naval War College, Newport (June 1975-July 1976); VP-31 Moffett Field (July-November 1976); NPGS, Monterey (November-December 1976); VP-17 NAS Barbers Point (December 1976-June 1979); CPW-2 NAS Barbers Point (June 1979-May 1981); and NUES DET Lualualei, HI, (June 1981-June 1987), where he retired as officer-in-charge.

His decorations include: Navy Expert Pistol Medal; Air Medal; Meritorious Unit Commendation; National Defense Service Medal; Vietnam Campaign Medal; Civil Actions Medal; Vietnam Service Medal; Republic of Vietnam eritorious Unit Citation with Palm; Sea Service Deployment Ribbon; Navy Expeditionary Medal; and Meritorious Service Medal.

In retirement, he and Niki owned Pearl Ridge Realty in Hawaii, where he became treasurer and rental property manager. Grandparenthood spurred the sale of the company and they moved from "paradise" back to the Mainland.

Elden played guitar, sang and in high school, was a member of the Teenbeat dance band. He carried his love of music through his life. He had a gift with words and a quick wit! He also loved hunting, swimming, water skiing and most of all, enjoyed playing golf with friends. He enjoyed life to the fullest, with a great love for his country, the military and his family.

Some of his greatest joys in life were competing in golf tournaments with friends, following his grandson's junior golf tournaments and traveling the U.S. watching his granddaughter compete in taekwondo tournaments.

Elden is survived by his wife of 49 years, Niki L. Weidman Rogers Ploof; two daughters (and their life partners), Cari Ann Carley (Richard Jaeger) and Deirdre Ploof (Carlos Carrasquillo); and two grandchildren, Nicklaus (fiancée, Hannah) and Darby, all of whom were the apple of his eye.

GORDON RUTHERFORD McDONNELL '66

"Rusty" McDonnell of Pasadena, CA, passed away peacefully at home surrounded by his family on 14 April 2021 after a long and courageous battle against prostate cancer. He was 77 years old.

Rusty was born in Mineola, NY, on 18 February 1944. He attended schools in New York City and New Rochelle, NY, graduating from high school in 1962. He was a member of the Naval Reserve and entered the Naval Academy with

the Class of 1966. Rusty spent his four years at USNA as a member of the 21st/31st Company. He was a large presence among his classmates and always provided enthusiasm, a positive outlook and a friendly smile.

After graduation, Rusty spent the summer of 1966 training Plebes and serving on the Supe's staff. Leaving Annapolis, he attended flight school before transferring to the surface fleet. His first ship was a minesweeper off the coast of Vietnam, which was followed by an assignment as Rear Admiral Draper Kauffman's flag lieutenant at ComNavPhil in Subic Bay. After completing his Philippines tour, he was assigned to a guided missile cruiser based in Long Beach, where he spent his remaining time in the Navy before resigning in 1970.

While in the Navy, Rusty had developed a strong interest in the stock market. Pursuing this, he began a long and very successful career as an institutional stockbroker with Jefferies Group, a global investment banking firm. John is survived by his brother, Mark Joseph Harty of Taipei, Taiwan; and his nieces and nephews, Patricia Abrams, Lillian Harty, Mark I. Harty Jr., Colleen Peters, Kate Bowers and Tess Harty Smith.
