023 was a transformative year for the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation (USNA AA&F). A decade in the making, the Fluegel Alumni Center held its official opening on 8 September. This achievement, thanks to alumni generosity, marks the beginning of a new era for USNA AA&F.

Alumni now have a central meeting spot for reunions and special events. The Fluegel Alumni Center has a dedicated space to host conferences, board meetings and informal gatherings of the alumni community. With more than two dozen events under our belt as of this writing, we are already seeing the positive impact of bringing our alumni together in a space they can call their own.

We now have the entire 100-plus person enterprise under one roof for the first time offering greater opportunities for collaboration and more efficient operations. The Fluegel Alumni Center has been tailored to better serve and support alumni throughout their life.

In August, the USNA AA&F's travel program successfully hosted many of the 7,500 members of the alumni community who traveled to Dublin, Ireland, for the Navy-Notre Dame game. What a sight it was to see so much Blue & Gold in Ireland. That experience illustrated the strength of alumni bonds.

In the coming year, our travel program will feature several World War II centric trips. They include Victory in the Pacific, WWII in the Philippines (March), Honoring the 80th Anniversary of D-Day in Normandy (late April and early May) and a D-Day Anniversary Cruise (29 May–8 June).

In a special offering, Admiral Robert Natter '67, USN (Ret.), will serve as guest lecturer during a 22 February-6 March Vietnam by Sea tour. Admiral Natter earned a Silver Star for his service in Vietnam, which included swimming his crewman to safety during a Viet Cong ambush.

2023 also was notable for the Alumni Association Board of Trustee's passage of Strategic Plan 2030 in May. This plan will guide the organization's strategic path through the rest of this decade. The enterprise is already making progress on several initiatives including:

- Creating a baseline of alumni support services for our 69,000 alumni. We're building programs from scratch where we respond to the needs of our alumni across their entire lifetime journey. From getting a job after military service to eventually planning memorial services, we will enhance the support we provide alumni during all phases of life.
- Communicating to our alumni community how the USNA AA&F is organized and why we exist. We're making strides in telling people what we do through multiple channels including Shipmate, Wavetops, social media and an array of new connection products like Rhumblines and more engaged video.

We are closing out a productive 2023 and riding a wave of positive momentum into 2024. And speaking of riding...

Memorable Ride

On 5 October, I had the privilege to join the classes of 1973 and 1983 on the final leg of their cross-country bike rides. These two classes were kind enough to welcome Captain Frank Franky, SEAL and

deputy director for ethics at the Stockdale Center, and me for their momentous final day in the saddle. They celebrated their 50th and 40th reunions, respectively, by cycling nearly 3,400 miles. The two groups traveled separate paths from the West Coast, but converged at Arlington National Cemetery to bike the final 52 miles to the Naval Academy together. It was a fitting reminder of the strength of the unbreakable bonds forged at the Academy.

The Class of 1973 memorialized fallen classmates along their journey while '83 raised more than \$663,000 for nonprofits helping veterans (including more than \$112,000 for USNA AA&F). The ride was an extraordinary example of commitment, collaboration, honoring fallen classmates and continuing a life of service. The classes of 1973 and 1983 have laid down a marker that will hopefully inspire future classes to find creative ways to celebrate milestone reunions (see story on page 6).

As we look ahead to greater engagement with the alumni community in 2024, we are committed to traveling to meet alumni where they are. Fluegel Alumni Center Officially Opens

The 8 September ribbon cutting for the Fluegel Alumni Center was an opportunity for U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation (USNA AA&F) leaders to express gratitude for the outpouring of generosity from the alumni community. Admiral Robert J. Natter '67, USN (Ret.), thanked Donna and Rick Fluegel '61 for making the first major commitment to an alumni center that houses the entire Alumni Association and Foundation enterprise. It also includes conference rooms and spaces for special events, reunions and for alumni to reconnect when they return to Annapolis.

"It's more than just the money, it's the fact that (the Fluegels) stood up and were willing to take a chance," said Natter, who chaired the center's joint advisory panel. "That enabled us to do this. Because of

your example, a lot of other great people stepped up. Thank you for what you've done and continue to do."

Admiral Mark E. Ferguson '78, USN (Ret.), chairman of the Alumni Association Board of Trustees, said the opening of the Fluegel Alumni Center is a testament to the devotion of Naval Academy alumni, friends and family. That was evident as nearly 1,300 plankowners, including newly commissioned ensigns and second lieutenants, joined the fundraising effort.

"Thank you for our new home," Ferguson said. "Our new home might sit on the banks of College Creek but it rests on a foundation of love, commitment and perseverance. It rests on our commitment to provide our Academy with the Margin of Excellence to remain one of the top schools in the country and provide leaders for the Navy and Marine Corps.

"That commitment is manifested in the generosity of our donors." Ferguson said the center will be focal point of the Alumni Association, Foundation and Athletic & Scholarship Program's efforts to support alumni and the Academy.

"It reflects the power of our community's philanthropy, and it represents our commitment to our alumni and the Academy for generations to come," he said.

USNA AA&F President and CEO Jeff Webb '95 thanked his predecessors and the volunteer leaders who laid the foundation for the Fluegel Alumni Center to become a reality. Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro '83, Naval Academy Acting Superintendent Rear Admiral Fred Kacher '90, USN, and Annapolis Mayor Gavin Buckley were among the guests at the ribbon cutting ceremony.

Webb said the Fluegel Alumni Center is the nerve center of the alumni community, and the vehicle through which the USNA AA&F will organize critical support for the Naval Academy for generations to come. He thanked those who stepped up with gifts for the center. He noted the building is paid in full and the enterprise has a healthy sustainment fund for future care of the facility.

"From the Fluegels' lead gift, we had a cascade of support at all levels," Webb said. "Thirty-nine major donors stepped forward, who you will see recognized in the named spaces in and around the building. We had organized support from 37 classes, as well as one Shared Interest Group, USNA Women."

The U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association Women's Shared Interest Group (WSIG) dedicated the digital display it sponsored at the Fluegel Alumni Center on 9 September. The Alumni in the News digital display screen showcases the impact alumni have made in uniform, in the private sector and in their communities.

The display is designed to be updated to highlight Naval Academy alumni accomplishments. During the dedication, the display featured Commander Juliane J. Gallina '92, USNR (Ret.), the

Academy's first female Brigade Commander; the Academy's first Black Commandant Vice Admiral Bruce E. Grooms '80, USN (Ret.); Captain Sunita L. Williams '87, USN (Ret.), who is a former record holder for most spacewalks by a woman (seven) and most spacewalk time for a woman (50 hours, 40 minutes); the Academy's first Black female graduate Janie Mines '80: the first woman Commandant of Midshipmen Rear Admiral Margaret D. Klein '81, USN (Ret.); and the first Women's Shared Interest Group President Captain Barbette H. Lowndes '80, USN (Ret.).

Current Women's Shared Interest Group President Linda G. Postenrieder '82, applauded the donors who stepped up to support the Alumni in the News display. She said 42 of 45 donors are alumnae and their classes span between 1980 and 2017. The donors stretch from Hawaii to Maryland and each warfare specialty is represented. The Class of 1994 led the way with six alumnae donors.

"I just can't thank you enough," Postenrieder said.

Millsap '05 Directs Documentary Offering Hope Amid Opioid Crisis



Serving others continues to drive Chase Millsap '05.

Following his career in the Marine Corps and as a Green Beret, Millsap produced a 2016 documentary spotlighting the efforts to help an Iraqi officer immigrate to America.

The offier saved Milsap's life and the film, The Captain's Story, shows the struggle the officer faces to get his family to safety. Millsap's latest project is Small Town Strong, a documentary

highlighting a team of athletes struggling with opioid abuse in Portsmouth, OH, as they combat addiction with fitness.

Filmed over four years with his brother. Spencer, Small Town Strong focuses on a town once known as the pill mill capital of America. Since 2007, the same year Millsap deployed on a second tour to Iraq, fatal drug overdoses have been the leading cause of accidental death in Ohio, with nearly 80 percent of cases resulting from fentanyl in recent years.

Millsap documents how, Portsmouth, a small town in the heart of Appalachia, has discovered a way to break the cycle of addiction, isolation and despair through fitness and community.

"For me, this project was more than a calling, it was a mission," Millsap said. "There's an addiction battle raging in our communities, our neighborhoods and even our families. In a time when synthetic opioids, especially fentanyl, are the leading cause of death for Americans under 50. Small Town Strong offers a message far different from other narratives about the crisis. Like all great comeback stories, our film captures hope."

Classes of '73 and '83 Conclude Cross-Country Rides Together

After cycling more than 3,200 miles over six weeks, members of the Naval Academy classes of 1973 and 1983 completed their separate cross-country rides together for the final 52 miles from Arlington National Cemetery to the Naval Academy on 5 October.

The Class of 1973 used its ride—which began on 4 August in Astoria, OR—to honor classmates they've lost. At least one of the 138 members of the class were honored each day of the journey and a link was added to a chain for each classmate lost.

Doug Leland '73 was one of five Class of 1973 riders to ride across the nation. He said honoring his fallen classmates was an emotional and meaningful endeavor.

"It was very emotional," Leland said of adding links to their chain. "Every day we were honoring one or more. We were talking about their lives, accomplishments and their families. It becomes much more personal.

"It had more of an impact on all five riders than any of us thought about before we started this ride."

The Class of 1973 did a lap around the Yard before having a moment of remembrance at the Columbarium.

"It wasn't just a joy ride around the Yard," Leland said. "We had 138 spirits we were bringing back to the Naval Academy."

The Class of '83's Ride Across America started on 23 August in Whidbey Island, WA, and concluded with a front-wheel dip into College Creek from the Hubbard Hall dock with the Class of '73. Along the way, the class raised more than \$663,000 for veterans organizations including \$112,000 for the Naval Academy Foundation. The Class of 1983 had a total of 70 riders participate at some point along the way.

Dave Saba '83' said his classmates rallied around each other during the trip and leaned on lessons learned at the Academy.

"Everybody helped everybody," Saba said. "That's how we got there. All those basic principles we learned at the Academy—teamwork, everybody working together and you don't leave anyone behind—when you do something like that, it's amazing and life-changing."

Saba said providing a helping hand to nonprofit veterans organizations was a natural choice for his classmates. He was pleasantly surprised by the outpouring of donations.

"When we started creating this epic journey, we said we had to do something positive," he said. "Raising money for organizations that help veterans where government can't was important. That is beyond what we thought we could do."

Leland said the Class of 1983 proved to be the perfect partner. He challenged other classes to create their own legacy to honor classmates or help others.

"Think big," Leland said. "One of our objectives was to do something that was bigger than ourselves and meaningful. There are a lot of other things that can be done. The classes of 1973 and 1983 set the bar. Our challenge to other classes is to raise the bar. We want you to raise the bar. We want this to be just the beginning."

Vietnam By Sea

Admiral Robert Natter '67, USN (Ret.), will serve as guest lecturer during a 22 February-6 March Vietnam by Sea tour offered by the Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation travel program. The cruise includes visits to Ho Chi Minh City and Hanoi.

Admiral Natter was awarded the Silver Star and Purple Heart medals for his actions during his service in Vietnam. Three months into becoming officer in charge of a SEAL boat support detachment in the lower Mekong Delta, his small craft was caught in a Viet Cong ambush. All aboard were killed or wounded. Seriously injured, Admiral Natter swam ashore and then back with one other crewman, directing suppressing fire to bring the damaged boat through a hail of enemy fire.

The program features guest speaker Kim Phuc, who, as a child in 1972, was the subject of the famous photograph by Pulitzer-prize winning photographer Nick Ut. Jim Laurie, a TV news correspondent during the Vietnam

Team of Destiny

How the '63 Navy Football Team Keeps the Brotherhood Bonds Strong 60 Years Later

Reflecting on old times, booming laughs and a bond that has held the members of the 1963 Navy football team together since their time at the Academy were all highlights from the team's 60th reunion during the weekend of 20 October.

Known as "The President's Team," "The Team of Destiny" and considered the greatest Navy football team ever assembled, the 1963 team is many things, but most of all, it is an example of lifelong friendships.

"We had this feeling among one another that we are brothers. We never want to lose that," said '63 team captain Rear Admiral Tom Lynch '64, USN (Ret.). "We've been through plebe year here, summer training, four years at the Naval Academy, all the ups and downs of football ... we have this bond. These guys, they're my best friends in life. We are brothers for life."

The brothers don't take their time together for granted. Skip Orr '65, wide receiver for the '63 team, spoke on the team's bond beyond the sport.

"Each time we do this, the bonds just get stronger," Orr said. "We lose some people along the way, unfortunately, but we love each other. We care about each other."

The 1963 team was No. 2 in the nation, finished with an overall record of 9-2, and earned a chance to play in the Cotton Bowl against No. 1 Texas. Although they lost to Texas, the team crushed records and produced the Academy's second Heisman Trophy winner, Roger Staubach '65, who would go on to win two Super Bowls with the Dallas Cowboys and become a member of the National Football Hall of Fame.

"The '63 team was so good," Staubach said. "We beat Notre Dame, Michigan ... our season went along and that's what allowed someone on the team to win the Heisman Trophy and they picked me. It was the success of that team that really lit my life up."

Times may change, but the physical mission at the Academy stays just as important to the development of midshipmen as it did in 1963. Like the physical mission, the memories and shared stories also remain just as important to the team.

"The older you get, the better you are than when you were playing," Lynch said. "All of us are going to be All-Americans in the next five years, probably four or five more Heisman winners too!"

June '75 to receive Breakthrough Prize in Life Sciences



Captain Carl H. June '75, USN (Ret.), will receive the 2024 Breakthrough Prize in Life Sciences for the development of chimeric antigen receptor (CAR) T cell immunotherapy, a revolutionary cancer treatment approach in which each patient's T cells are modified to target and kill their cancer cells. The invention sparked a new path in cancer care, harnessing the power of patients' own immune systems, a once-elusive goal that brought fresh options for those who

could not be successfully treated with conventional approaches.

Dr. June is the Richard W. Vague Professor in Immunotherapy in the Perelman School of Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania and director of the Center for Cellular Immunotherapies at Penn Medicine's Abramson Cancer Center. He will be one of eight laureates who will be celebrated on 13 April 2024, at the 10th annual Breakthrough Prize ceremony held in Los Angeles, CA.

Founded in 2012, the Breakthrough Prize is the world's largest science award, with \$3 million awarded for each of the five main prize categories. June is the sixth Breakthrough Prize laureate from Penn, which joins Harvard and MIT among the institutions whose researchers have been honored with the most Breakthrough Prizes.

"This award is not only a testament to Dr. June's outstanding contributions to science, but also a shining example of the caliber of discoveries and research which Penn faculty set their sights upon," said University of Pennsylvania President Liz Magill. "We are immensely proud to have Dr. June as a member of the Penn academic community, and we know that CAR T cell therapy is just the first chapter in an inspiring and lifesaving new era of medicine."

June is internationally recognized for his role in pioneering the CAR T cell therapy. In August 2017, his work led to the first FDA-approved personalized cellular therapy which treated children and young adults with the blood cancer known as lymphoblastic leukemia. That approval spurred five additional approvals of the technique in other blood cancers. Gene-modified T cells engineered in June's lab to retrain a patient's own immune cells to attack cancer were used in the first clinical trial of CAR T cell therapy in 2010. Some of the earliest children and adults treated have experienced long-lasting remissions of ten years or more. In addition to the FDA approvals that have made the therapy commercially available to patients across the world, thousands more have benefited from clinical trials testing these transformative treatments, including for the treatment of solid tumors and even autoimmune diseases like lupus.

June, who is also the director of the Parker Institute for Cancer Immunotherapy at Penn, earned his medical degree from the Baylor College of Medicine. He is a 2016 Naval Academy Distinguished Graduate honoree.

WOMENIN NAVAL AVIATION 30 YEARS UNTETHERED

Two significant milestones in naval aviation were marked this year: 50 years of women aviators and 30 years since Congress repealed the combat exclusion laws. It has been a challenging, culture-changing journey. Women now fly *unrestricted* in all services.

The First Door Opens

The 1970s presented our country with challenges. Social upheaval, technology advancing with the speed of a moonshot and the potential ending of the draft, created a personnel crisis for the Navy: Recruitment was way down. Young men no longer needed an alternative to the draft.

Newly appointed Chief of Naval Operations Admiral Elmo Zumwalt '43, USN (Ret.), stepped in. Perhaps stirred by the anticipated passage of the Equal Rights Amendment, he moved forward with ways to attract young people to his new Navy. He said, "Not enough men ... bring on women!" And, he meant for more than administrative help—far more.

Zumwalt unleashed a flurry of messages; surprising many with what he conveyed in his "Z-Grams." In August 1972, Z-Gram 116, "Equal Rights and Opportunities for Women in the Navy" was the beginning of women in naval aviation. In a larger sense, it was the beginning of Navy women—officers and enlisted—reaching into all aspects of naval operations.

Eight women began Navy flight training in March 1973. The eight primary selectees were reduced to six with the voluntary withdrawal of two women. The six remaining student aviators quickly completed training and received their Wings of Gold in 1974: Lieutenant Junior Grade Barbara Allen, Lieutenant Junior Grade Judy Neuffer,

Based on the success of the first six women, Zumwalt declared there would be a second class. Eight more women began flight training in 1975 and eight more again in 1976. Then it was 15 per year; there was no turning back. The wave of change had begun.

More Change in the Air

Initially women were limited to flying helicopters (although not off ships) and propeller aircraft. Women were specifically prohibited from serving in combat aircraft and from entering the jet training pipeline. However, women such as Lieutenant Junior Grade Chris Giza were given

the opportunity to transition to T-39 and C-9 jet transport aircraft.

With more women seeking to joint their male counterparts flying fighter jets, it became necessary to mount a legal challenge. Helicopter pilot Lieutenant Joellen Drag braved the anticipated stigma and potential career downside to join a successful class-action lawsuit challenging, among other things, restrictions on the right for women to perform the same mission as men and land on Navy ships.

Meanwhile, by 1975, the Navy's Composite and Logistics Support squadrons (VC and VRC) had a handful of women flying C-1 Carrier Onboard Delivery aircraft, from land bases only. However, the lifespan of the old, noisy, radial-engine-folding-wing warrior came to an end. In Lieutenant Junior Grade Rosemary Conatser's VC-2 squadron, the C-1 was replaced with the A-4 Skyhawk, a single-seat tactical jet aircraft. Conatser's skipper was perhaps the bravest man in the Navy when he said, "she transitions just like the guys!"

Conatser, an exceptional aviator and dedicated officer, proved beyond doubt, "women can fly jets." With a few more women in the limited jet transport transition, Lieutenant Junior Grade Mary Louise Jorgensen, of the second class, immediately upon winging, was detailed to VC-7 at NAS Miramar. She completed the jet transition syllabus with the exception of carrier qualification. Women entered the jet pipeline.

Another Pipeline Opens— The U.S. Naval Academy

In 1975, a significant piece of legislation was passed when President Gerald Ford signed PL 94-106, opening service academies to women in 1976. With the Naval Academy graduating the first women in 1980, the Navy was pressured to accommodate the highly qualified women; more jobs opened for women in aviation, surface warfare and staff corps. The success of women Naval Academy, NROTC and Officer Candidate School graduates made the presence of women a force for change.

Chris Lewis Campbell '80 was drawn to aviation watching her Marine Corps test pilot father exchange sea stories with his fellow pilots. Her father's assignments included Edwards Air Force Base in the Mojave desert.

"Even as a little kid I watched dad shoot the breeze with fellow pilots on the back porch and was mesmerized by the exciting storie—lies—they told and how happy they seemed to be in aviation," she said. "The pride and pleasure and thrill they displayed had everything to do with my lifelong desire to be a military pilot."

Her arrival at the Academy nearly coincided with the entrance of women into the naval aviation community. Campbell's Navy career included flying the A-4E Skyhawk in support of U.S. fleet training and Western Pacific foreign navy training and serving as a flight instructor, specializing in the "out of control" or Spin Recovery program.

"The thrill and fun were real," Campbell said. "Just as in sports, if you work hard and are reasonably good you are always welcome on the team. The physicality of operating an aircraft combined with the mental demands were challenging and very rewarding ... These factors also honed one's ability to honestly critique oneself and heavily rely on a sense of humor.

After leaving naval service, she accumulated more than 10,000 flight hours as a line pilot for Delta Air Lines.

Captain Wendy Lawrence '81, USN (Ret.), served 11 years as a helicopter pilot, making more than 800 shipboard landings during her naval aviation service. She was one of the first two women helicopter pilots to make a long deployment to the Indian Ocean as part of a carrier battle group while stationed at Helicopter Combat Support Squadron (HC) 6. In 1995, she became the first Naval Academy alumna to go to space.

"I'm very grateful to the commanding officers at HC-6, my first operational squadron," said Lawrence, who earned more than 1,500 hours of flight time in six types of helicopters. "Thanks to their efforts, I was able to go on several shipboard deployments, just like my male colleagues."

Supporting Fellow Aviators

Naval Academy alumnae kept track of one another in their careers—especially in the early years. We watched as the women from 1980, including Rear Admiral Sandy Daniels '80, USNR (Ret.), Marjorie Morley Bachmann '80, Commander Kathy Karlson Ozimek '80, USN (Ret.), and Suzanne Grubbs '80. took to the skies. Then quickly followed Rear Admiral Peg Deluca Klein '81, USN (Ret.), and Captain Kay Hire '81, USN (Ret.). Women were

helping women navigate careers, family and new opportunities. And many male allies helped as well.

In many ways women aviators were still "building the aircraft as we were flying it" in terms of creating career paths that did not yet exist for women. Women filled in every aviation community that allowed them, always pushing for change.

On To Capitol Hill

In post-Gulf War 1991, political debate began. What combat roles should women aviators hold? Women had flown in the Gulf War, but only in support roles; in reality, women were in combat. They flew support aircraft carrying supplies to the front lines, but their aircraft could not be armed. Essentially, women could be shot at, but could not shoot back; time for change.

As debate grew, women military aviators including Academy alumnae Captain Barbara Bell '83, USN (Ret.), Captain Allison Webster '84, USN (Ret.), and Commander Nancy Dykoff Fechtig '86, USN, all of whom are Navy Test Pilot School graduates, raised a strong, professional voice in Washington, DC; they joined the network, Women Military Aviators (WMA), and began efforts to repeal the combat exclusion laws. Captain Rosemary (Conatser) Mariner spearheaded the charge. Active duty and reserve women of WMA joined forces with the Women Airforce Service Pilots

(WASP), the National Organization of Women (NOW) and the Women's Research Education Institute (WREI).

Military women traversed the halls of Congress educating everyone on the combat aviation roles women were qualified to fill. Women attended strategy meetings and hearings, met with members of Congress, were interviewed on television and wrote articles for *The Washington Post*. These advocates showed Congress that women military aviators had the skills, confidence and mettle to fly combat aircraft.

Greeting a group in his office, one senator came face to face with a young woman aviator he had appointed to the Naval Academy years before. Her passion welled up as she said, "You appointed me to the United States Naval Academy in 1979. It is now time that you give me equal opportunity in the Navy, sir." It is uncertain if the senator remembers, but Bell will remember it for the rest of her life. In the halls of Congress, the girl from a small town in Michigan, now a naval officer, speaking her truth; she had come a long way. All women aviators had come a long way.

Many senators and representatives listened. The FY92 Defense Authorization Bill repealed combat exclusions, allowing women to fly combat aircraft and to serve on combatant ships. In 1993, assignments became unlimited.

Vice Admiral Sara A. Joyner '89, USN, serves as director, Force Structure, Resources and Assessment, J8, Joint Staff. She flew F/18 Hornets and commanded units including the Strike Fighter Squadron 105 "Gunslingers." As part of the first wave of women in combat, she served on deployments in Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

She said her time in combat provided vital experience that proved invaluable as her Navy career progressed.

"If I were a naval aviator with a Hornet background and I hadn't been into combat, then I would be incomplete," she told *Shipmate* for an October 2020 story. "I would not be somebody that could represent our community appropriately at higher levels. I would have not been fully qualified in the eyes of anybody in my community."



Lieutenant Commander Catherine E. Gillies '89, USN (Ret.), earned her Wings of Gold in 1991. Her initial career goal was to be a surface warfare officer. However, she returned from her first-class summer cruise seeking another community. She and a classmate were the only two women on board and they were subjugated to unwanted attention.

About a week into their tour, a call went out for volunteers to go to Helicopter Control Officer School. Gillies jumped at the opportunity.

"I knew the minute I walked through the hangar door that I had found my place," Gillies said. "They smiled. They liked each other. They loved their jobs. I decided that helos would be a good fit for me because I could still go to sea, but that I would be able to get off the ship when I had had enough.

"Helicopters worked out beautifully for me and I couldn't believe I got paid to do that every day. The flying was awesome, and I got the opportunity to open a few doors for women behind me."

VADM Sara A. Joyner '89, USN, flew F/18 Hornets as part of the first wave of women in combat. She served on deployments in Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. She is currently director, Force Structure, Resources and Assessment, J8, Joint Staff.

Gillies served on seven different aircraft carriers. She and a fellow women pilot in her first squadron were the first women pilots to be attached to KITTY HAWK.

"When the Combat Exclusion Law was lifted, I became the first woman pilot to fly in a Marine Corps squadron (as a Sailor)," she said. "I retired from the Navy after 20 years, and I loved almost every minute of my career."

Commander Kristin Barnes '92, USN (Ret.), served in several combat zones as an F14 Radar Intercept Officer. She accumulated nearly 3,000 hours with 703 arrested carrier landings during her career.

Barnes was unable to meet the requirements to enter the Navy diving community, so she chose aviation in 1992.

"I had no idea of what was to come only one year later when the combat exclusion was repealed in '93," she said. "That path set me up to be in a F14 Tomcat back seat until we retired the platform in 2006.

"It's very difficult to describe that mindset shift that happened in '93—it was a huge shift in agency over my life from 'where am I allowed to go?' to 'where do I want to go?' That simple shift has made the difference in every choice I've made since then. I guess in a very profound way, I found my adventure after all. Finding my way to naval aviation at that time in U.S. Naval history helped me find the courage to make my own path in life instead of being told what to do."

The Doors Are Open—CAVU (Ceiling and Visibility Unrestricted)

Today, women in the military fly everything men fly, and they are increasingly more visible. Women have risen to the ranks of captain, colonel, admiral and general. Surface warfare officer Admiral Michelle Howard '82, USN (Ret.), became the first woman four-star; she served as vice chief of Naval Operations (VCNO), and, as the commander, Naval Forces Europe. Rear Admiral Amy Bauernschmidt '94, USN, commanded ABRAHAM LINCOLN and now serves as deputy commander, U.S. 7th Fleet.

Commander Becky Calder '98, USNR, is grateful for the courage, resilience and



determination of the women who came before her. In 2004, Calder was selected to attend the U.S. Navy's Fighter Weapons School (TOPGUN). She became the first female pilot to graduate from the program. She flew the F/18 Hornet for 15 years, including in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Calder credits her predecessors for paving the path in naval aviation. She said it's important that she and her contemporaries assist future generations.

"Their collective service and sacrifice bravely opened doors, shattered glass ceilings and made it possible for me to pursue my dream," Calder said. "We all share in the responsibility to assist and mentor the next generation. As leaders in the military, one of the most important things we can do is train our replacement. We need to encourage, empower and enable everyone that comes after us to be better than we were."

During her career in the cockpit, Calder said she focused on being the best F/18 pilot she could be and taking advantage of the opportunity to serve.

"Our country was at war, and being the 'first' was never part of it for me," she said. "The jet truly does not care about gender—all that matters is credibility and capability. There was an incredible naval flight officer who went through TOPGUN before me, Commander Elizabeth Malecha '94, USNR, and she was instrumental in showing me what was possible.

"As I have gotten older, and especially since becoming a parent, I realize the importance of representation and I am honored and humbled to share in the collective legacy of opening doors for others to go through. While I may have been the first pilot to go through TOPGUN, I most certainly am not the last and that is what truly matters."

Lieutenant Colonel Jeannette Haynie '98, USMCR, was determined to fly Marine Corps Cobras. Ignoring the naysayers,

she earned her seat in the attack helicopter. She flew while pregnant with all three of her children and cherishes her time as a pilot.

"(The Cobras) looked tough and intimidating, the community was not friendly to women, and the mission was such a unique one," Haynie said. "After repeatedly being told that women couldn't or shouldn't fly attack helicopters, it was a clear choice. It ended up being a hard but worthwhile choice, too."

Thanks to the pioneering women aviators who made those hard but worthwhile choices, opportunities for women continued to unfold. Women aviators and submariners became astronauts. The U.S. Congress has a record number of women serving, several are military aviators, Navy veterans and Naval Academy graduates.


The first wave of women naval aviators and women Naval Academy graduates were not an experiment to be proven wrong; they were given the opportunity to change the world. Success was often a bumpy road traveled alone. Today, the naval aviation family is all encompassing.

Ensign Samantha Chapen '23, USN, said she was drawn to the naval aviation community by the people. She said she was lucky to have numerous inspiring aviation mentors who were eager to share their passion for their craft with the next generations.

Chapen said her summer cruise in Jacksonville, FL, with Helicopter Maritime Strike-74 sealed her decision.

"Flying with the squadron showed me firsthand the aviation community holds one of the most exciting, but imperative jobs in the Navy," she said. "Pilots specifically exhibited qualities like courage, ambition and passion. I felt my personality and interests meshed the most with people from the aviation community ... I am very excited to enter such a thrilling career of flying, while doing it alongside amazing people with an even bigger purpose."

MIDSHIPMAN ETHOS CHALLENGES BRIGADE TO ASPIRE TO HIGHER VALUES

haracter development at the Naval Academy can be traced back to the creation of the Honor Concept in 1953. The Honor Concept concisely outlines behavior that is unacceptable of a

midshipman: lying, cheating or stealing. While this is certainly a baseline for morality, it is not the complete picture of honorable living. Following a major cheating scandal in 1992, a committee chaired by then-Ambassador Richard Armitage '67 noted this fact, saying:

Character development is far more than not lying, cheating or stealing. The Honor Concept is more than a simple set of rules or procedures; it is a "way of life." Every future Navy and Marine Corps officer must weave honor into the fabric of his or her being, professional and personal. From Induction Day, midshipmen must realize that the content of their character, and the degree of attention given to it by the Academy, are central to their development as future officers. When midshipmen adopt and internalize the honor ethos, it must not be solely for fear of punishment, but because they aspire without reservation to the right course of action.

 Report of the Honor Review Committee to the Secretary of the Navy on Honor at the United States Naval Academy, 1993

The committee also concluded the Honor Concept had come to be viewed as a "punitive process" and an "obstacle to be avoided" rather than an aspirational ideal that could change the way they lived. In accordance with these observations, the committee recommended the creation of a new document to supplement the Honor Concept and set out the basis of character development in "thou shalt" language. The following year, in 1994, the Honor Treatise was created, but in the following decades it was not used to its potential.

By 2022, in the wake of another cheating incident at the Naval Academy, honorable living became a major focus of the Commandant. At the squad level we all discussed what constituted honorable living and the topic came up in "Dant's Calls" frequently. Around the same time, I signed 2 for 7's and attended the Second Class Commitment Dinner, where the Honor Treatise was read; this was the first time that I had ever heard the Honor Treatise. Just a few weeks later I had the unique opportunity as a member of the Brigade Honor Staff to interview the Commandant about his perception of honor at the Naval Academy. I asked him about the Honor Treatise, noting that despite the Brigade's unfamiliarity with it, the document seemed directly tied to the concept of honorable living. To my surprise, I walked out of the Commandant's office that day with a charge to review the Honor Treatise and use it as the basis for an updated document that is meaningful to the Brigade.

As the Honor Staff discussed the perception of honor throughout the Brigade, we noted that the issues identified by the Armitage Committee were still prevalent. The Honor Concept was a great baseline for defining behaviors that must be remediated, but it alone actually does very little to guide midshipmen toward living a virtuous life. We concluded if the Brigade had an opportunity to revise the Honor Treatise, we would be able to deliver a document that simultaneously inspires midshipmen to improve their character while speaking to the values and challenges faced by midshipmen today.

After a handful of meetings, consultation with officers and mentors, a Brigade-wide town hall and a discussion with Medal of Honor recipient Britt Slabinski, our committee of nine midshipmen had identified the ideas that we wanted to be encapsulated in our document: the four cardinal virtues of wisdom, courage, temperance and justice; the privilege of serving our nation; teamwork; dignity and respect; and upholding a standard of excellence, to name a few. Upon completion of the draft, our group realized that what we had created was not just a treatise on honor, but rather a document that describes the beliefs and aspirations of the Brigade. An ethos for midshipmen.

Since its adoption the Midshipman Ethos has been incorporated into Brigade training at various levels, most notably Plebe Summer, where the Class of 2027 memorized it as a rate. In the lifelong and often confusing journey of developing virtue, the Midshipman Ethos serves as a guide for midshipmen. We recognize that living an honorable life is about more than only abstaining from lying and that phrases often used in Bancroft Hall such as "be a good dude" provide no concrete

direction. The Midshipman Ethos does not replace the Honor Concept but builds upon it as a set of values that all midshipmen and graduates can hold close as pillars of their character during their time at Annapolis and beyond.

From the Commandant's task to revise USNA's Honor Treatise to the final document we uphold now, contributing to the Midshipman Ethos has been an honor and truly formative experience. The Ethos is not an entirely new document; however, our intention as a committee along with our overseeing leadership, and the Brigade

as a whole, was to revitalize and modernize a document that was passed down to us by our predecessors. In their time, the Brigade faced its own unique challenges. In ours, we are adapting as well.

Nonetheless, we recognized that the foundation of our responsibility as midshipmen at the United States Naval Academy is unchanging and should thus be articulated in a concrete ethos, while addressing our evolving environment. I found it educational and eye-opening to work with fellow

midshipmen from various backgrounds and perspectives. Individually, we each brought our own thoughts and biases to the table and together, we shared them to form a draft.

With time, our draft was molded and reshaped by countless officers and members of the wider Brigade. Ultimately, the Midshipman Ethos is a living document that deserves our attention, reflection and revision. I'm grateful for the opportunity to have shared a hand in forming the Ethos we see today and eager to see how the Brigade continues to evolve while remaining grounded in our cardinal structure.

Midshipmen who major in astrophysics are essentially physics majors who took their four open electives as astronomy classes. They also work with an adviser to design a syllabus to get them to the level of understanding needed for their thesis topic.

ince 13 October 1775, the mission of the U.S. Navy has been defense. First, providing and maintaining the security of the original 13 states; then of the territorial U.S. And since 1945, that of our allies and partner nations as well.

But only very recently has that remit expanded to include defense of the entire planet, against the possibility of dangerous—actually, existential—threats from outer space.

PERPETUAL TRACKING

The idea of deep space threats was first seriously posited in Berkeley physicist Luis Alvarez's 1980 theory that massive extinctions eons ago were due to asteroid impacts.

The prehistoric Chicxulub impact, 66 million years ago, is believed to not only be the cause of the Cretaceous–Paleogene extinction event, but accelerated the evolution of mammals, leading to their dominance and in turn, setting in place the eventual rise of humans, Alvarez theorized. The danger entered wider public consciousness with such disaster films as Meteor, Without Warning, Armageddon, Deep Impact and Don't Look Up.

Dr. Jeff Larsen, the head of the Naval Academy's astrophysics department, has a less apocalyptic outlook than Hollywood. "Asteroids, they're the least likely natural disaster," Larsen said. "Compared to every (other) natural disaster. There's only been two people injured by asteroids, by strikes."

More than a thousand were injured in the Chelyabinsk Event over Russia, in 2013, but those injuries were to people who saw the flash, went to a window and had the slower shockwave blow broken glass on them.

"But if we found the Big One, yeah, it would suddenly become very important," he said. "The good news is I've been working on this for 25 years now and we're at the point where we're starting to close the problem on the risk."

A graduate of the University of Minnesota, Larsen was working on asteroid detection at the University of Arizona when a colleague from the Academy, Professor Debora Katz, contacted him seeking telescope time for a Trident scholar. Larsen started working with midshipmen, setting up the 20-inch telescope on the roof of Michelson Hall for near-earth asteroid follow up. A faculty position at the Academy opened in 2004.

Physics studies are officially headquartered in Chauvenet Hall, but many of the astro faculty work and teach in Hopper Hall. Equipment includes

three telescopes, as well as a good deal of associated equipment such as cameras and cosmic ray detectors. A radio telescope was scheduled to be installed by mid-October.

The main working scopes are two half-meter optical reflecting telescopes. The primary one is permanently installed on the roof of Hopper Hall. The other is located across the Severn, at Greenbury Point. Both are 20-inch (500mm) corrected Dall-Kirkhams that can do either optical imaging or spectroscopy.

The oldest telescope on the grounds—actually, one of the oldest large telescopes in the Western Hemisphere—is the 7.75-inch equatorially-mounted achromatic Clark refractor. Visitors can see it as they enter the Yard from Gate Eight. The Class of 1941 Observatory is the silvery domed building next to the aircraft exhibit.

The Clark was one of the first major (and most expensive) pieces of scientific equipment the Academy bought. Manufactured between 1855 and 1857 at Cambridgeport, MA, by Alvan Clark and sons, it was one of the items the then-Superintendent was ordered not to permit to fall into the hands of the Confederacy. These days it's used mainly for outreach, to give scouts and school groups a taste of classical astronomy and to host viewings by the Naval Academy Astronomical Club.

ON THE HUNT

The Academy has two stations, with two 20-inch telescopes, that can take pictures of the sky.

"But you have to watch an asteroid for a long period of time to work out its orbit," Larsen said. "So, if we found an asteroid yesterday and somebody measured it today, that orbit is probably only good for 48 hours more. After that it'll diverge and become lost. So, you have to keep watching it."

He compares the work to hunting.

"There's any number of orbits that could be behind this motion," Larsen said. "And we're not exactly sure we have the right orbit, so you have to keep looking. So, we're part of a network and there are amateurs and professionals doing this."

The network is the Minor Planet Center (MPC) at Cambridge, MA, the world repository for asteroid orbits. They're funded by NASA and organized under the International Astronomical Union (IAU). The Naval Academy acts as an observation station that contributes data to refine the orbits.

There are surprisingly few other stations. So few, the Academy has to fill a major gap. Hopper Hall is the first observatory on the East Coast that can pick up and track an object after the last European station in the Canary Islands loses it.

One might expect the Naval Observatory to be involved, but their mission is navigation.

"They compile what's called the Washington double star catalog," Larsen said. "They watch stars orbit each other. Sounds boring, but it's actually pretty dark. Let's say the nukes are flying at the end of the world and GPS is down. You want your nuke to hit the right site. So, you have

a stellar navigation system. But the problem is, because many stars are double stars that orbit each other, they appear as a single object. But that single object is not quite at the center of the system. So, they maintain a list of binary star orbits so that they can correct the position of the stars in the navigation system."

The midshipmen are intimately involved in the Naval Academy's work of detecting incomers, maintaining the observation chain, calculating orbits and reporting the results. Larsen and Dr. Matthew Knight have trained students on the new telescope on Hopper since the fall 2021 semester. The telescope was given an official IAU designation, necessary for submitting asteroid tracking data, in January 2023. Knight, an assistant professor, focuses on comets, with asteroids as a secondary interest, both being "small bodies" in astronomical terms.

What happens if they *do* detect something that looks ominous? It's not how it's portrayed in the movies.

"An astronomer takes a picture," Larsen said. "Oh, it's gonna hit us. And he proceeds to drop his pizza, panic and drive his Jeep off a cliff. Even fast asteroids don't work that way. So a lot of times we call them hazardous because we look at the orbits and play darts."

"Playing darts" has nothing to do with Irish pubs. Larsen means that the Earth is a pretty tiny bullseye.

"So when we say the chance of impact is one in 200, we're literally saying that at the moment the asteroid's orbit intersects a perpendicular going through the Earth, the Earth's projected area is one 200th of the area the asteroid could pass through," he said. "This is why astronomers sometimes look dumb. There's an asteroid that's got a one in 10,000 chance of hitting the earth. We study it and it's like, oh wait, it's more like one in 200. People in the news start paying attention. And then, oh, guess what? It's not gonna hit at all ... The odds will rise the more you study an asteroid, right up to the moment that you say, okay, it's gonna pass. Then they drop to zero."

FILLING THE GAP

Astrophysicists can use the Naval Academy's computers and Gauss's Method to determine provisional orbits. But more often, they measure the positions and brightness of asteroids very precisely relative to all the stars in the field of view, then report that information to the MPC and let them calculate an orbit. The Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) Asteroid Watch center at CalTech forwards impact hazard assessments to the Planetary Defense Coordination Office at NASA headquarters in Washington, DC.

Knight received his Ph.D. from the University of Maryland, then worked at the Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, AZ, before moving back to the University of Maryland as a research scientist.

Knight said astrophysicists "tend to go for recently discovered objects that are potentially hazardous, but there are not enough data yet to confirm it."







Astrophysics majors at the Naval academy take astronomy, two semesters of astrophysics and observational astrophysics. Midshipmen have access to several telescopes and supported NASA's DART mission, which entailed crashing a satellite into an asteroid 7 million miles away to measure how the target's orbit changed.

"Then, we can report those to the central clearinghouse for measuring orbits and calculating orbits," he said. "One of our advantages is that because of our longitude, there aren't many professional observatories here ... So, if we come in when there's an object that needs more data to be confirmed we can kind of fill in that longitude gap and okay that data and report."

The most impactful tasking the Academy has supported was NASA's recent DART mission. The Double Asteroid Redirection Test was the first planetary defense mission attempted by Earthlings.

Launched on a SpaceX Falcon 9, this mission sent a 610-kilogram impact body and an Italian camera-equipped cubesat (small satellite) 7 million miles to a two-asteroid system called Dimorphos and Didymos. Originally, the 5-billion-kilogram Dimorphos took 11 hours and

55 minutes to orbit the larger Didymos. On 26 September 2022, the impactor slammed into Dimorphos at 14,000 miles an hour.

Following the impact, ground-based observers, including those at the Naval Academy, measured how the target's orbit changed. It now takes Dimorphos 11 hours and 23 minutes to circle Didymos, meaning the DART impact changed its orbit by 32 minutes. This was at the upper end of the published range of plausible outcomes, and much larger than required by NASA for the mission to be deemed a success. It's a big step forward should the "Big One" ever be detected heading our way.

Knight was involved with DART before coming to the Academy, and both he and Larsen were instrumental in bringing the mission to the Academy.

RELEVANCE ON THE YARD

What does this all look like from the point of view of a current member of the Brigade? And to the Navy?

The starry science was taught at the Naval Academy from the very beginning in 1845, by William Chauvenet, originally in the department of mathematics and later by the department of astronomy, navigation and surveying. It's now part of the physics department.

That department currently has about 30 faculty members, with teaching and research duties split among the military and civilian professors. It comprises a number of different specialties. Physics track majors take advanced quantum mechanics and thermal physics, and choose from acoustics, condensed matter, optics or nuclear physics. Astrophysics track majors take astronomy, two semesters of astrophysics and observational astrophysics.

Astrophysics at the Naval Academy currently has five faculty members, two of whom are full professors and two tenure track. Dr. Christopher W. Morgan was ROTC at Vanderbilt. After finishing his obligated service, he went back to graduate school at Ohio State. There, he got interested in gravitational microlensing. He's also involved in extragalactic astrophysics and quasars. Morgan, a submariner, is also a Navy Reserve captain.

Other current astro faculty include Dr. Jamie Lomax, an assistant professor. Her specialty is massive stars, those 100,000 times and more the mass of our sun. Commander Brent West '94, USN, is a neutron star theorist. Although each faculty member specializes, those same astronomers also teach the core physics classes all midshipmen are required to take, along with upper-level physics courses of all sorts.

For the midshipmen, an astrophysics major is basically just a physics major who took their four open electives as astronomy classes, plus working with an adviser to design a syllabus to get them to the level of understanding needed for their thesis topic. As Larsen points out, astrophysics employs the same mathematics and physics as any other discipline.

From the Navy's viewpoint, any sensor that can look up to the stars can also be placed in space and look down. There's a lot of crossover between astronomy and in-orbit reconnaissance, as well as to celestial targeting, as discussed above.

Obviously, the new Space Force may be interested in signing up some future Naval Academy astro grads, though Air Force is

the only academy to have an accession program. Ostensibly, Naval Academy alumni are eligible to apply for transfer from the Navy to the new service. But so far, Larsen says, the USSF has not defined their requirements enough that the department can attempt to fine-tune its classes to conform.

Midshipmen seem to feel their major has a great deal of relevance already.

Second Lieutenant Taiyo Tatara '23, USMC, was born and raised in Japan until age 8, then lived in New York.

"I have had aspirations to become an astronaut since age 4 due to an old Japanese fairy tale about a rabbit making mochi on the moon," Tatara said. "I was fascinated by the idea of setting foot on the moon and experiencing the beauty of space from a vastly different perspective."

Another budding astrophysicist is Midshipman Kate Villa '24, a Trident scholar working with Knight and Larsen.

"As a child, I would look up and be spellbound by the majesty of our galaxy painted across the sky," Villa said. "Astrophotography always fascinated me ... Choosing to study astrophysics came as the most natural decision of my life.

In all honesty, astrophysics doesn't have the most direct purpose when it comes to our mission as warfighters in America's Navy. Nonetheless, as the battlefield changes, our experience with tracking and imaging celestial objects will be invaluable to military efforts."

She's planning for a career in Navy Air.

Each night, as twilight comes on, a small group gathers on the roof of Hopper Hall, or in the computer rooms beneath it, studying the universe for new threats to our fragile planet. It's the same mission alumni have always trained for, protection and defense. But with a magnificence and danger few of us ever dreamed would be one of the many missions of the United States Naval Academy.

CELEBRATES 25 YEARS

As we celebrate the 25th anniversary of the center in 2023, there's much to look back on with pride and wonder. For perspective, I solicited the thoughts of my predecessors Dr. Al Pierce and Colonel Art Athens '78, USMCR (Ret.). They laid the groundwork and established the momentum for everything we enjoy today. Their work and the work of all those who have served in the center since 1998 have given substance to the aspirational vision that the Naval Academy could create a resource to serve as a "Beacon for the Nation" on all matters related to ethical leader development.

Of the founding of the center, Pierce writes:

In August 1998, when I started work as the founding director of the new ethics center, VADM John Ryan '67, USN (Ret.), gave me a one-sentence vision statement—be an ethics resource for the Naval Academy, the Navy and Marine Corps and the nation,'—four empty rooms and told me 'build an ethics center.' For the next seven and a half years, that's what I tried to do. In February 2006, when I returned to the National Defense University as professor of ethics and national security, the center had a core staff and a menu of programs touching all three levels of that vision statement. Through the Naval Academy Foundation's good work, the center had a solid financial foundation.

In 2008, at the tenth anniversary of the center, it was gratifying to see that much of what we had built was still in place and Art Athens had taken the center to a new level of engagement.

In 2023, I see how Joe Thomas has led the center to even greater heights. One of the last interviews I had in the process of being chosen as the founding director was with Dr. David Hamburg, longtime president of the Carnegie Corporation of New York. One of the things he said in that interview has stuck with me all these years later, 'If you are offered this job and accept it, you will be in the institution-building business. I've built many institutions, so I know that it is important work.' For the past 25 years, many talented men and women have done just that, and the Stockdale Center for Ethical Leadership is the institutional fruit of that effort. Bravo Zulu!

Of the expansion of the center, Athens writes:

I first met Admiral James B. Stockdale '47, USN (Ret.), in 1987 through the White House Fellowship program and he became a mentor, counselor and role model for me. Shortly

after meeting Admiral Stockdale, he handed me a book entitled A Vietnam Experience, a compilation of his speeches and articles published after his return from captivity. On the book's first page, Admiral Stockdale wrote, 'Don't read too much of this stuff at any one sitting.' This was the only time I disobeyed an order from Admiral Stockdale! I would read that book annually and still do to this day. Little did I know when he handed me the book that 20 years later, I would have the opportunity and honor to lead a center named after this American hero.

When I reflect on my tenure as the center director, I remain very grateful for the team with whom I worked. Their talent, drive, vision and integrity inspired me daily. Though there is a lengthy list of what that team accomplished, I believe some of the most important contributions the center made included establishing an Influence the Influencer program to invest in the Academy's staff, faculty and coaches; creating a Leadership Innovation Lab to explore unique opportunities to further the study and application of ethical leadership; reestablishing the Distinguished Chair of Leadership and the Distinguished Chair in Ethics; renewing a focus on honoring the former Prisoners of War and their accomplishments; and expanding the center's investment in the Department of Defense, the federal government and other organizations of national and international prominence.

When the center hosted the premier showing of the Smithsonian Channel's documentary, Spy in the Hanoi Hilton, I experienced one of the most memorable moments of my time at the center. After the movie ended, former POWs Captain Red McDaniel and Commander Danny Glenn discussed their captivity and clandestine activities under the leadership of Admiral Stockdale. The evening concluded with a very personal and emotional exhortation to the midshipmen in the audience from Dr. Jim Stockdale. Admiral Stockdale's oldest son. As the audience left, a third class midshipman came up to me to thank the center for sponsoring the event and said, 'Sir, tonight reminded me why I came here and the responsibility I have in the future.' That statement and similar comments made by other midshipmen reminded us we were providing the resources and opportunities necessary to accomplish our aim to 'help develop the future Jim Stockdales.' 🤊 🤊

I feel a great debt to Al Pierce, Art Athens and all the members of Team Stockdale who served here in Luce Hall. As I personally reflect on my past 20 years at the Academy, much of it spent just down the hall in the leadership, ethics and law department or across the road in Bancroft Hall, I can say I've never been more optimistic about the future. When PBS televised our feature-length film POW: Passing on Wisdom earlier this year, millions got to experience how the lessons of the Vietnam War POWs continue to inspire and inform midshipmen today. The immersive augmented reality scenarios, podcasts



and presentations disseminated through www.stockdalecenter.com are accessed by thousands across the globe every week.

The Influencer Development program invests in Academy staff, faculty and coaches in ways no other institution of higher education in the world does—giving them skills to think of themselves first as leadership developers. The Ethics Debate Team recently brought home the Ethics Bowl National Championship. The center has positioned itself at the cutting edge of efforts to measure return-on-investment of leadership programming with the pending hire of the Dave and Amy Dawson Director of Leadership Research

and Assessment. The recently established Stockdale Artificial Intelligence Laboratory is driving a conversation about how AI will shape the future of education, leadership and ethics (www.aileadershiplaboratory.com).



The annual McCain Conference continues to grow as "the world's premier military ethics conference." The reach of the center has never been greater and there are plans to expand it even further. The promise of Artificial Intelligence as an aide to education, the quality of the young men and women who choose to serve and the generous support of alumni and supporters indicate a very bright future indeed. LEARN TO LIVE UP TO YOUR POTENTIAL

In the weeks leading up to Naval Academy
Preparatory School (NAPS), I read motivational
speeches like "Make Your Bed" by Admiral
William McRaven, USN (Ret.). I listened to podcasts
and recordings on leadership from Jocko Willink.
I had discussions with my parents and my mentors
on leadership styles. I wanted to arrive feeling
motivated and armed with some background
knowledge in military leadership soft skills.
I focused on preparing myself to be the best
leader I could be. However, the concept of 'leading
myself' never crossed my mind.

FIVE MINUTES WITH... MATICE WRIGHT-SPRINGER '88

Annapolis native Matice Wright-Springer '88 was intrigued by aviation from an early age. Wright-Springer's fascination with flight took her to the Naval Academy and, ultimately, she became the first female Black naval flight officer. During her career, she logged thousands of flight hours in the EC-130 and the E-6 aircraft.

She was presidentially appointed to serve as a White House fellow at the Department of Treasury following her service in the Navy. Her private sector experience includes work as a foreign military sales helicopter manager with Lockheed Martin, a senior strategist with L3 Harris and as a technical director with ManTech International Corporation. She is currently senior vice president of Booz Allen Hamilton's Aerospace, Global Defense Sector.

Wright-Springer serves on the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association's Board of Trustees and is a member of the Academy's Distinguished Graduate Award selection panel.

Shipmate: What/who inspired you to pursue naval aviation?

Wright-Springer: First, I've always been fascinated by aviation. Like Wilbur and Orville Wright, my inquisitive nature and fascination with things that fly led me to question the science behind things that actually fly like butterflies, birds, kites and airplanes. And I've always loved math and science, which are both critical for flying.

I'm from Annapolis and I attended Germantown Elementary School, which is really close to the Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium. I recall Naval Academy football games and graduations where, from my school's playground, I could see and hear Navy jets and helicopters buzzing the stadium and I would get so excited to see and hear the roar of the jet engines as they sped through the air with effortless and seemingly endless power. I still get excited with every flyover that I see.

Second, the house I grew up in was only a mile from Gate One of the Naval Academy. My mom still lives there. Throughout my childhood, my family sponsored midshipmen. The midshipmen would frequently attend family gatherings or simply join us for meals and help me with my math and science homework. It was during a sponsor family gathering that I learned that midshipmen could fly after graduating from the Naval Academy. Lieutenant Charlie Thornton '80, USN, was a midshipman my family sponsored and was like a big brother to me. He selected naval aviation as his career path. At the same time women became graduates of the Naval Academy, I began thinking that maybe naval aviation could be a part of my future.

And third, in 1982 during my high school junior year I remember seeing the movie *An Officer and a Gentleman*, where Richard Gere completed the Navy's Aviation Officer Candidate School. A seed was planted. During that same time, I had the privilege to meet Captain BJ Penn. He was stationed at the Naval Academy as a battalion officer. He was the first Black aviator I ever met. I recall seeing the wings on his

uniform and hearing him speak about how fun and challenging flying was. I was hooked. I was so impressed with him and soon I found myself desiring to follow in his footsteps to fly in the Navy. The Honorable BJ Penn later served as the acting secretary of the Navy and continues to be a role model for me to this very day.

Shipmate: How important were the trailblazing women who preceded you in naval aviation to opening doors for you?



Wright-Springer: I believe I was a student in flight school when I first heard the name Bessie Coleman. For those who don't know Bessie "Queen Bess" Coleman, she was the first Black woman to earn a pilot's license. A Black woman born in 1892 was not allowed to enter any American flight schools and certainly wasn't permitted to fly in the military, including in the Navy. During WWI she heard stories about pilots and was encouraged to travel to France to earn a pilot's license because she couldn't earn it here in the United States.

She was successful in pursuing and accomplishing her aviation dream. Queen Bess became one of America's first female barnstorming aviators several years before Amelia Earhart learned to fly. One of my favorite posters proudly hangs on my office wall and reads—Women Fly Bessie Coleman: 20th Century Hero. It shows her portrait and her quote "I refused to take no for an answer." Bessie Coleman's bravery and persistence were critically important to me as I made my way through my naval aviation career. Like Bessie Coleman, I also refused to take no for an answer.

While at the Naval Academy, in flight school, and in the fleet/Navy, I had numerous people tell me that no one that looked like me had ever done what I was trying to do and that I wouldn't be successful as a naval flight officer. I persevered anyway. Rear Admiral Peggy Klein '81, USN (Ret.), was a department head when I checked into my squadron as an ensign. She was also a naval flight officer and she was critical to my success at VQ-3.

Shipmate: As the first Black woman naval flight officer, how important was it for you to continue knocking down barriers for those who followed you?

Wright-Springer: As the nation's first Black woman naval flight officer, I stood on the shoulders of many that were not afforded the opportunities that I had. They made a way for me and I continue to make a way for others—paying it forward. I think it is super important that I continue to knock down, step over, climb around or jump through any barriers that I encounter because many more barriers need to be knocked down. Not only am I making a way for broader representation in previously exclusive yet noble professions like naval aviation, I also think it's the inclusivity of our differences that can lead to things like new solutions and greater productivity that ultimately support better outcomes and broader contributions from all of us.

o Navy, Beat Army!—the first of many chants we learned (if not previously known) during Plebe Summer. At Army-Navy games, we relentlessly heckled the Corps of Cadets, most notably through the hollering of "whoop-whoop" in unison, referring (as you know) to the resemblance of the Cadet's uniforms to the costumes worn by the whooping flying monkeys in the movie The Wizard of Oz. And while we, as midshipmen, poked fun at the "greylegs" (in the Navy fight songs) from USMA, we all knew that upon commissioning, we (USNA and USMA alum) became part of the best military force in existence-

the joint force affectionately known as America's team.

Now immersed in the joint force, we use teamwork and leadership skills—acquired prior to our arrival and enhanced during our tenure at our respective service academies—to develop camaraderie and unit cohesion necessary to carry out the military duties of our nation. A few of the many missions conducted by the joint force include executing duties while deployed on amphibious warfare ships (as Marines assigned to the Marine Expeditionary Unit and sailors assigned to the Amphibious Ready Group), while

assigned to a Joint Task Force in support of various domestic or international crisis or as a staffer assigned to one of the combatant commands (i.e., United States European Command). During any one of these assignments, you will find yourself engaged in planning and executing missions alongside fellow service academy brethren and other joint teammates, allies and partners.

In the Joint Staff J7's Joint Training Directorate, I found yet another opportunity to serve alongside my brothers and sisters from U.S. Military Academy (and U.S. Air Force Academy too!), specifically in the Deployable Training Division. The DTD provides Deployable Training Teams to Joint Force Commanders to enhance readiness through training by observing staff processes and procedures and providing constructive feedback and recommendations to optimize performance, commander decision-making and mission accomplishment. JFCs request DTT support during command-level exercises or in times of crisis or conflict, and at a time of great power competition, DTTs are in high demand. In the photo, I had the opportunity to deploy with Major Brendan Baker '06, USMA, in support of AFRICAN LION 23 (USAFRICOM's premier exercise). During our time in Germany, Brendan reaffirmed the importance of jointness and showcased the highest caliber of West Point alumni. The "so what"—we truly are one team, one fight ... but always Go Navy, Beat Army! 🕹

This year there were two Distinguished Submariners, **VADM Paul E. Sullivan '74, USN (Ret.)**, and **ADM Edmund P. Giambastiani Jr. '70, USN (Ret.)**. The Naval Submarine League Distinguished Civilian selectee was **CAPT Carl H. Oosterman '69, USN (Ret.)**.

The NSL Distinguished Awards were presented on 8 November 2023 at the Naval Submarine League Annual Symposium and Industry Update in Arlington, VA.

The Naval Submarine League Distinguished Civilian Award recognizes the personal contributions of government and industry individuals who have been of extraordinary value to the success of United States Navy Submarine Programs.

Oosterman is recognized for his 41 years of government service, which encompassed multiple key management assignments in the submarine and nuclear surface ship fields in addition to his continued government service as a member of the senior executive service to include the formation of a field office in the United Kingdom to improve the exchange of nuclear propulsion technology.

The Naval Submarine League Distinguished Submariner Award recognizes the personal contributions of submarine qualified individuals, officer or enlisted. The award is given to the most deserving individual when considering his or her lifetime achievements. The contributions may have been during distinguished service in positions of responsibility in the fleet or, following naval service, the awardee made contributions of extraordinary value to the success of the submarine force, the Navy or the nation.

Sullivan served in the Navy with distinction for more than 34 years. He draws on his extensive naval career as the primary consultant and senior advisor on AUKUS Submarine Safety, Acquisition, Design and Submarine Research and Development.

Giambastiani served in the Navy for 37 years. His final assignment on active duty was as the seventh vice chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the second-ranking officer in the U.S. military.

THE ARMY-NAVY GAME.....No matter where the '39 Classmates and their families were in the world, and no matter what time of day (or night), they would never miss watching (or listening to) Navy play Army! All through their lives they would gather with friends for the big game. '39 Classmate Herb Kriloff kept a treasure trove, his 1935-1939 USNA scrapbook including Army-Navy game memorabilia. His daughter, Alix Bradfield, in Australia has compiled this column from some of the material in that scrapbook as a happy memory of our Class.


....."There is no greater, more historical sports rivalry than the Army Navy Game. The event has been one of the great traditions in our country since it began in 1890.

Navy had competed as a football team since 1879 when it challenged Army to what would become the first event in an ongoing series. Army accepted although their side had never before played an organized game. West -6 team won that first Army-Navy game 24-0.

After winning in 2021 and losing in 2022, the Army Navy Game will be played for the first time in it 124-year series in New England on December 9, 2023.

Veterans, fans from the Naval Academy and graduates will be calling out, 'Go Navy! Beat Army!' That phrase never changes, and it seems the well-known cry goes back to the origins of the game in the 19th century, although it is not clear which team initiated the tradition.

area although the game was held in Chicago in 1926 to honour the American service members



We know that there is no more famous historical sports rivalry than this event and our Class of '39 Midshipmen were excited to attend the Army-Navy game in 1936 in Philadelphia when Navy won 7-0. Herb Kriloff kept newspaper reports and other memorabilia from that very chilly November day. '39 Classmate,

'39: News clipping An American Eagle's Eye-view of the Game.....' From far and wide they came yesterday to the Municipal Stadium for the great Army-Navy grid classic. And the photographer took the above aerial view to show you how it looked just before game time. Down in the center of the bowl the Cadets can be seen drilling, their band stationed at the lower end of the great oval. Those ants which seeming line the bowl, and struggle in black dots about its entrance, turn out not to be ants after all, but really lively lady and gentlemen fans. The black rectangles at either end of the 50- yard line are the spaces reserved for the Midshipmen and Cadets. And those peculiar block formations which extend far and away about the stadium and look for all the world like markings indicating troop positions on a military map, are parked cars- thousands of them.'

Ken Hysong- who played on the team every year and earned a coveted N* (NSTAR) - was part of that winning team in 1936 and his name is often mentioned within the 1939 Lucky Bag football records.

The '39 Lucky Bag had this about their final football season... "Navy's 1938 football season was not all that had been hoped for in the way of victories, but the story told the score is not

all. Navy played hard, clean, consistent football, and gave every opponent a run for his money. The friendships formed among the fellows, the admiration and regard for the coaches, the spirit of teamwork and cooperation, striving through victory and defeat toward one goal; these things made Navy's season a great one, gave cherished memories to all those who played even a small part in making it so.'

Robert Sleight, in his book 1600 MEN, United States Naval Academy 1932-36, wrote the following about the Army-Navy rivalry:

'Our rivalry in everything was deep.
Competing in an Army-Navy conflict was a thrill distinct from any other. From time to time, efforts to halt the competitions between Army and Navy have been lobbied (mostly from members of Congress). The main concern about the rivalry is that the promotion of ill feelings between the service branches weakens our national defense. Fortunately the game goes on. The rivalry is so intense because we recognize a kindred clan in the Army. We certainly share the same rigorous life even though half of us wear grey and half blue.'

'The game is about the regiment, not the team. There was very little attention paid to a .cademics the week of the Army game. Most Profs accepted that – they had been midshipmen once upon a time themselves. Chants of 'Beat Army' rang through the halls and around the Yard all week. The team left for Philadelphia on Thursday following a huge rally and bonfire on Wednesday evening. The fact that the team was no longer within ear shot in no way lessened our enthusiasm. Like some pagan ritual we were whipping ourselves in to a frenzy of zeal and anticipation."

Game day came. The march to the trains was accompanied by cheering townspeople even at the hour of 0430 or 0500.

USNA 23 November, 1936 Special Order regarding travel to 28 November Army-Navy game in Philadelphia, PA. We arrived at a special disembarkation spot in Philadelphia hours before game time and then, around 1400 finally marched onto the field. Once in place in

the stands brought no relief or rest for the spectator. No one sat down at the Army game unless he fainted dead away. The noise was incessant from both sides of the field. The very fact that anyone was still on his feet and making noises by kick-off time was a tribute to the fitness of us all.

We arrived back at Annapolis in the vicinity of 0200 Sunday morning. We were allowed to sleep in until 0700 rather than arise at the usual 0630!'

****Editor's note: A great article appeared in the 2023 September issue of Shipmate entitled, "Keepers of the Goat." It tells the history of Bill the Goat and the USNA Eighth Company which has been tasked with maintaining, supporting and even protecting the Navy Goat. There are two bronze statues at the Academy of a charging Bill, sporting the N*star blanket with stars representing each time Bill was present when Navy defeated Army in football. The first statue was donated by the Class of 1915. In keeping with the Another Link in the Chain tradition, the Class of 1965 has taken over the maintaining of that statue and has even refurbished the bronze as part of their responsibility as "Keepers of the Goat. In the Class of '65 are four sons '39 Classmates: Lloyd Abbot (James Lloyd "Doc" Abbot), Bob Green (Robert R. Green), Doug Norton (Marvin D. Norton), and Harry "Chip" Seymour (Harry A. Seymour).

SPECIAL ORDER NO. 38-36.

SUBJECT: Army-Navy football game in Philadelphia, Pa., 28
November 1936.

1. The Regiment of Midshipmen will leave the Naval Academy at about 0730 on Saturday, 28 November, to attend the Army-Navy football game in Philadelphia, Penna., entraining at West Street Station, Annapolis, and arriving in Philadelphia near Municipal Stadium about 1120-1150. The Regiment will entrain for Annapolis at Baltimore & Ohio Station, 24th and Chestnut Streets, at about 2120-2140 on Saturday, 28 November, arriving at Annapolis about 0020-0040, Sunday, 29 November. Detailed instructions and times covering the movement of the Regiment for this occasion will be issued by the Commandant of Midshipmen.

2. All drills and recitations will be suspended on Saturday, 28 November, and the following routine will supersede the regular routine for the day:

Reveille 0545
Assembly for morning roll call 0610
Late bell 0613
Absent bell — publish orders — march to breakfast 0614
Sick call 0645
Assembly on battalion parades 0715

Regular routine will be resumed upon the return of the Regiment.

3. The Bellevue-Stratford will be "Headquarters" for the Regiment in Philadelphia.

4. The following checkage against midshipmen's accounts is authorized:

The amount under paragraph (a) above for incidental expenses is authorized to be drawn by each midshipman attending the game, prior to the departure of the Regiment for Philadelphia.

5. During the absence of the Regiment of Midshipmen from the Naval Academy the Fire Bill, "No Midshipmen at Naval Academy", will be in effect.






Letter from the President





more permanent place in the literature of the Academy and persuaded Hamil to collect his cartoons, which, with Noble's commentary, became *PLOOB* the book), published in 1949. A copy is now part of the permanent collection at the Smithsonian.

USS HANNA SECOND CRUISE

Submitted by Byron Lee
This cruise was to be a six-month tour stationed in Guam. The Navy Admiral stationed there was responsible for all the islands in the Southwest Pacific that had been occupied by the Japanese. The ship was to visit the islands to see whether or not they needed anything and whether there were any problems. Our Commanding Officer was a LCDR, who had no

hope of promotion—he intended to enjoy his command. He was an excellent ship handler and liked to do spectacular things. This didn't endear him to his seniors, but the crew worshipped him. His approaches to underway refueling and docking were exciting. He endured many Boards of Inquiry, usually about loss of the Sonar dome. He always reported that we hit a whale!

I was the Gunnery Officer, which made me the Landing Officer, so I made many, many landings on the islands. In general, we would take a motor whale boat towing an inflated raft. We would hunt for an opening in the coral reef, then take the raft ashore. I carried a .45 pistol as a symbol of my authority. There were still Japanese on the islands, but they weren't interested in being found. We would be met by the leader. He would crack a coconut for us to drink the milk, then take us to a meeting place. Often, they were schools where the children sang songs to entertain us. We checked to see whether or not they needed medical supplies or batteries for their radio. We might land on 6 to 10 islands a day. It was exhausting.

The CO took the ship in places that had never been visited by a ship of our size. We weathered two typhoons— all of us sick. We were able to visit Japan for rest. The CO always gave me the 4-8 watch while we maneuvered through hundreds of fish nets. I was aboard for four months of the 6-month cruise.

We visited the Carolines, the Marianas, the Volcanoes and the Bonins. The CO wrote a book, "A Handful of Emeralds", Meredith, published by the Naval Institute. It is full of anecdotes during visits to the islands.

This Zoom call covered Academy Course NE203: Ethics and Moral Reasoning for Naval **Leaders** is a required course for all Third Class midshipmen, and has been taught at the Naval Academy since 1998.

The presentation was made by CAPT Rusty Yeiser, USN (Ret.), USNA '74, who has taught the course for the last fifteen years. He provided an excellent overview of the course including examples of the case studies used to illustrate the types of ethical challenges that midshipmen are likely to face as commissioned officers.

Rusty explained the purpose of NE203 is to prepare midshipmen to fulfill the special moral obligations inherent in their commission and oath of office. Course objectives are to develop an appreciation for the moral complexities of officer ship, an understanding of the ethical demands of combat leadership, a basic understanding of classical and contemporary thought in moral philosophy, and a roadmap for putting moral theory to work in the service of practical moral reasoning.

While there I briefed their Shadow Government referred to as the Bow Study Group."

PAUL A. PETZRICK

Energy Resource Administrator

Born in Menomonie, Wi., Paul A. Petzrick is in his 31st year as an employee of the Maryland Department of Natural Resources. After having already retired from 30 years in the U.S. Navy and the U.S. Department of Energy, he felt like he still had more to accomplish. At 93 years young, Petzrick is currently a power plant site assessor in the Power Plant Research Program (PPRP), a team that is involved in licensing power plants in Maryland and Pise acam that is involved in licensing power plants. Most frequently, Petzrick is charged with researching innovations in producing electricity and the side effects of producing electricity.

His love of electricity began when he was a young boy reading books written by pioneers in the field including Ben Franklin, Thomas Edison, George Westinghouse and Nikola Tesla. That love continued long after he left that one-room school to study at the Stout Institute and University of Wisconsin before entering the U.S. Naval Academy.

He received a bachelor of science degree and was commissioned as a Navy line officer upon graduation in 1954. He subsequently attended Renesselaer Polytechnic Institute and received a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering and transferred to the Civil Engineer Corps of the Navy. He received his master of science degree in engineering science from Princeton University in 1966.

During his Naval career in the 1970s, Petzrick served with the Naval Material Command where his last assignment was Director of the Navy Energy and Natural Resources Research and Development Office at the Washington headquarters. He held numerous construction and public works positions during his naval career including an assignment in Viet Nam as Chief Staff Officer with the 32nd Construction Regiment. At Headquarters Naval Material Command, Petzrick initiated the Navy's program in Environmental Protection before becoming involved in energy research and development.

Petzrick has co-authored studies and given presentations before the mineral and energy industry and other groups, and for his work in energy and environmental protection, he received the Navy Legion of Merit and the U.S. Navy League's William S. Parsons Award for Scientific and Technical Achievement in 1975. Petzrick was also the Navy nominee for the Rockefeller Public Service Award in 1974. Paul was appointed as charter member of the Senior Executive Service of the US Department of Energy when it was created in 1977.

After retirement from federal service in 1984 he ultimately accepted a position at the Maryland Department of Natural Resources 1991, and at 93, Petzrick is the oldest current employee of the State of Maryland. He currently resides in Crownsville, Md.



70th anniversary of completing Plebe Summer '53

A **Don Regenhardt** (19) memory:

■ I arrived and was sworn in a few days later than most of the class due to a physical re-exam.

My plebe summer crew included Bill Curry (14), Pete Boyne (6), Larry Bryson (4), and others I don't recall. I was immediately in "catch-up" mode with serious stenciling - and the resulting envy of those with surnames that didn't stretch across the entire front of their whiteworks. The memorable event occurred at my first formation in Tecumseh Court. The officer of the watch chose my crew to inspect. He stopped in front of me and focused on my shoes. Not knowing to keep my eyes in the boat I followed his gaze and noticed a dramatic difference between my shoes and those of my neighbors - black mirrors versus dull black. He asked for an explanation, and not yet knowing the proper "no excuse sir" I offered my opinion. "Sir, I arrived later than most of the class and I believe they ran out of the good shoes before I got here." His comment as he walked away, 'We've got a long way to go with this one!"

New topic: From Bats Pelphrey (23). At one of the recent class Zooms, someone mentioned that meals were now optional. That just blows my mind. As best I recall it, the meals during Plebe Year were the principal source of our hazing and getting come-arounds. Can some Annapolis resident explain what happens now with the plebes?

Peerenboom responds: About optional meals: One of Zumwalt's early Z-grams got rid of reveille aboard ships. Mids caught on to that and pressured to get it eliminated in Mother B. That got a resounding NO until the supply officer who managed the ration cost suggested lots of savings if breakfast was made optional. That was greeted as a stroke of genius, except it was feared that there would be bad press if plebes complained to their moms that they weren't being fed breakfast. So the compromise was to MAKE plebes go to breakfast with a token number of upperclassmen supervising and that was it. I was stationed at the Academy when that happened and it did generate some alumni pushback. But money and liberalization carried the day. Shortly thereafter the mids sued to get rid of mandatory chapel and won. Some say it has been downhill ever since.

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Like all such things they progress, and over the years almost all meals became optional as did most meal formations. We became aware of that in recent years when we tried to present the support check to the 22 Co. and had to schedule it on a day when a formation was set to happen.

Meanwhile, the ration cost continued to drop to match the diminished number of mids who actually ate. Then when the Supe who relieved VADM Rempt took a "round turn" and reinstated mandatory meals they found themselves in the awkward position of insufficient funding and hungry plebes. There was a bit of bad press then.

Received a note from **Jim Poole** (15) on the June publication of a family memoir by his wife, Ginger. The Walter and Eleanor Gillen Story took Ginger and her sister three years to research and write. Jim and Anne Smith, wife of **Jerry Smith** (1) assisted with editing.

SUMMER CRUISE 1955 - Part V

(from the diary of Dave Ault, 10th Company) LAND HO!

18 June 1955 - Oh, the wonder of seeing a new land for the first time! As Hemingway said, "the hills of Africa are Green" - a beautiful green that really tempted me to get ashore. I'd like to come back some day. It looked so rugged and peaceful at the same time. Spain looked the same upon my first glimpse of it, but for some reason Africa was the land that held my gaze - it must be the mystery and intrigue that are so often connected with that continent. The Rock of Gibraltar was one of the more interesting sights of the day - and my life as a matter of fact. After hearing and reading so much of it, it was a thrill to see it. I got some pictures; they should make interesting showing at home. I certainly hope Mom can see all of this some day. I look at it and I wish everyone could see it. There's so much to go around. Africa drifted out of sight through the afternoon, but the mountains of Spain were still on the horizon when we hit the rack - made for a

very nice sunset over the Mediterranean. I think I'll come back some day – Had a smoker tonight instead of movies – it wasn't a satisfactory substitution, I didn't think – the boxing was fun to watch, but the other talent was typically amateur. To sum it up, it's been one of the greater days of my short life – new lands, sights, etc. I hope to see so many more.

19 June 1955 - Well, when we got up this morning we were surrounded by water again the sea is just a little bit bluer and the weather balmier and clearer. All in all, it's a great sight to wake up to - today was a hectic one - the ROTC's took over for the 2nd phase. Tom and I are staying for a couple of weeks and then will go back into the grind of a seaman's life. We'll work harder, but have more free time when it's over. I guess it won't be too bad, and we really should get a little Navy out of this cruise. Well, land, mail and women tomorrow. I'm all prepared to set out - liberty, Geneva, ID and camera cards. Also all the other little essentials. Saw "Student Prince "tonight. The music was wonderful - I really enjoy Mario Lanza's voice. Especially when mixed with Romberg. Very good show - well to bed - I probably will miss a couple of days of this, but will try to catch up must sleep out tonight to help me think of home. Goodnight all.

20 June 1955 - Clear, hot. Up at 0530, anchored at 0803 - left the ship immediately and set foot on Espana at about 0900. After a taste of our first Spanish beer we got on the train for Madrid. We saw some beautiful Spanish country, but the 13 hour train ride was hell otherwise. We all slept most of the time. It was terrifically hot and even though we traveled first class it was poor traveling - the Spanish food I go for was not - well we arrived in Madrid at 2400 and went immediately to the Hotel Plaza. What a joint! It was really high class, expensive stuff. Great beds, etc. After cleaning up, Harlow Manahan and I went out to see the town, Our first impression was a good one - it looked great! I'll never get over these European's attitude toward women and sex. It's really quite different and exciting. We went to the York club for a show dedicated to the USA Navy and then went roaming the streets again. Got to bed at 0500.

21 June 1955 – Up at the ungodly hour of 1300. Was great to just loll around in bed instead of turning out. Went on a tour of Madrid today – the Royal Palace, Plaza de la Sol, old Madrid, parks, bull ring, etc. It wasn't very satisfactory because we didn't see much – too much time was spent in an art museum. El Greco, etc. I didn't like it too much. Well, got back and bought some film – had supper at an american restaurant – food wasn't cooked. After chow we went on our usual inspection tour of Madrid. Met a most wonderful little girl via Russ Thorn – made another date for tomorrow – to bed at 0530.

22 June 1955 – Up at 1300 again – missed the Toledo tour. Sat around sidewalk cafes, talked with Spanish Midshipmen and also had coffee with a teacher from U. of Colorado – interesting. Did some window shopping - took mucho pictures. Harlow and I then went to see "Candleejus" (Limelight) with Charlie Chaplin. It was in Spanish, but could be understood. Charlie was pretty funny - sad story though. After the show we met a few of the guys and went and ate. Had the usual speech difficulties and had a mess-up to the tune of 100 pesetas. Afterwards we did our usual girl window shapping Abreabout Twee otto the Worterey and ordered beer Chica hadn't arrived - she later walked in and got the usual stares, etc. I was surprised that she recognized me but she did and we got a table. She ordered her usual milk. Mario later came in and we just sat around and talked. Rat never showed up so we took off together (Harlow later got the dog tags). I hit the rack early tonight - 0300. Slept well too.

Matthew Kelch - The USNA Alumni Association received a call from a friend informing us that Matthew "Matt" J Kelch passed away the third week of July. Matthew "Matt" J Kelch passed away on 21 July 2023 at his home in Thousand Oaks, CA. Matt was born 19 December 1936 and he entered the Class of 1959 of US Naval Academy from Skokie, IL. Our next stop was Ephesus. The ancient ruins of a city of 1/4 million people is about 25% uncovered. It was the third large city in the Roman Empire at the time. It must have been magnificent in its prime as the ruins were spectacular.

From Ephesus we sailed to Patmos where John had been exiled. The cave and monastery were interesting but not so spectacular.


Lastly, from Jim Knorr:

Some of us in '62 reported directly to Submarine School in July after graduation. Historically, officers reported to the school only after at least one sea tour. Since the pipeline had become so long for JOs to become nuclear trained; beginning in '60, the classes were largely filled with direct inputs from USNA & NROTC. This created a serious billeting problem: while a ton of Married Officers Quarters (MOO) were unfilled and available, the BOO was totally unable to house all of us single guys. So, we were offered BAQ for off-base housing. As a result, Carl Nardone, Carmine Tortora. Pablo Zimmerman and Walt

Welham moved into a "snake ranch" on Groton Long Point. For those in the Class who did not have the pleasure of knowing Pablo, he truly is/was really a piece of work... but in a very good way. During the Summer, Pablo sold his very "cherry" white Jag 4-door sedan to classmate **Hugh Tabb** so he could purchase a '46 "Aeronca Chief", a single engine airplane like a Piper Cub. Well, as Fall & Navy's Homecoming approached, Pablo & I decided to fly down to Annapolis to attend the ceremonies. At the time, my Dad was the Academy's Senior Medical Officer living in quarters, on the Yard, at 10 Porter Road. All we needed to do was get there. Sub School firmly denied our request to leave early at noon on Friday. So, Thursday we filled the plane with gas, clothes, charts, and snacks (important flight rule: you can never have too much gas except when you're on fire). Pablo had initially planned to land at Lee Airport in Edgewater, MD, but it's a "day only" airport, so we weren't totally out of the woods yet. We made a right turn & flew up the Severn. Well. what do you know? The D&B Corps was practicing for Saturday's game on Farragut Field and all the Field's lights were on!! We had found the spot to land; Pablo headed for Halsey Field House, did a 180 and landed. When we walked into the house on 10 Porter, my mom was preparing dinner for us. She inquired, "How did you get here, **Walter**?" I replied, "We flew." She sighed and replied, "I am so glad, it's such a long & dangerous drive". A few minutes later, my dad came in after attending Dahlgren Hall Reunion activities. He also inquired about how we got there. When I told him, "We flew", he then asked where we had landed (he was expecting DC or Baltimore). I replied "Farragut Field". After a short pause, he said, "Where is Farragut Field?" "At the end of the street" I replied. The phone then rang, Dad answered it and quickly handed it over to me: it was Captain Julian Burke, Academy Deputy Dant. After exchanging pleasantries about Sub School (he was a dolphin wearer as was the Supe), he asked, "Do you know anything about the plane on Farragut Field". I replied, "It's not mine, but I do know the pilot." He said, "I figured you might, we found your check book in the cockpit." I elated how we had flown down from New London and were anxiously looking for a safe place to land. The next morning, I

believe every aviator assigned to the Academy was assembled on Farragut Field to observe/grade Pablo's take-off for the aforementioned Lee Airport. I purposely elected to drive a car there to pick him up.

On Sunday. We flew back to New London without incident.

SITREP on Arrangements for '62 Gathering

■ Dear planning committee members,

When Stew sent my 62nd anniversary planning letter to the Class in early September, we asked those interested in attending to let us know by the end of this month. Responses have been more enthusiastic than I expected but have started to trickle down as the month has passed. The last count I have from Stew showed 62 classmates and 110 total attendees from as far away as California, Oregon, Washington and Florida. I recognize that these numbers may change when attendees actually start looking at travel, lodging and event costs, but I am excited that we are going to have a good turnout.

Also, as I said in that September letter, our one-day anniversary event will consist of an afternoon memorial service at the Academy, followed by an informal reception and sit-down dinner served buffet style. Notionally, we discussed holding the reception/dinner at the new Alumni Center or similar waterfront location with shuttles between all events. I have learned that currently the Academy has no wedding scheduled for the 6th, so we should be able to use the main chapel for the memorial service. Because 6 June 2024 is also the 80th anniversary of D-Day, I ask Bill and Nick to please think about how we ought to weave remembrance of D-Day into our memorial service.

I have been working to nail down preliminary arrangements for the long pole in the tent, the reception/dinner, and to identify relatively affordable hotel accommodations in Annapolis at an establishment that provides free parking. In Annapolis, affordable hotels with free parking are few. We have arranged for an RFP to be sent to every hotel in town meeting this description. The list of such hotels includes the Holiday Inn Express, Double Tree by Hilton, Crowne Plaza and Marriott Courtyard, among others. We'll see what responses we get in the next several days. As you know, none of the big four (Waterfront Annapolis, Graduate, O'Callaghan, Westin) offer free parking, which would make it inconvenient to have any of those as shuttle pick up points. On the other hand, some of our classmates may want a more upscale room than available from a Marriott Courtyard or Double Tree, so we'll have to discuss how we balance these competing desires.

Regarding a venue for the dinner, I met with the Alumni Association reps managing room rental and they penciled us in for June 6th at the Natter room, a quality event space at the Alunni Center that could well accommodate our group. As an additional feature, the room has a large adjoining balcony overlooking College Creek. The price for the space, tables & chairs, A/V, etc. would be \$1,000. We would separately engage our choice of caterer who would supply table linens, food and drink. The Alumni Association provided me a list of 5 caterers they typically use, and I intend to interview 2-3 of those in the next two weeks.

I also would like to investigate alternative venues for the dinner, including the Severn Inn and even the Annapolis Yacht Club. If any of you have other ideas for venues and would like to help with reception/dinner arrangements, I would welcome the help. Otherwise, I am proceeding as described above. Nick, if Grag Chauncey can provide you any lessons learned from the last west coast reunion, I also would be pleased to hear them.

As some of these options for hotels, rooms and caterers get priced, we probably ought to have another planning committee meeting at the West End Grill to nail down as much as we can. I'll keep you informed of progress.

My focus is "Keep it simple and do it well." Have a great day.



I heard from several SEALs that there is one rule to upcoming SEALs, and other matters in life, "Don't give up!" It's amazing how three simple words can be so clear and to the point in your success in whatever you do. Although he and his team have all aged, move a little slower, they all have a discipline and a fire in them that sets them apart from other men. They don't give up — they are, and always will be, SEALs.

As promised in recent columns, beginning with this issue, each of the next nine *Shipmate* Columns will begin by honoring one of our ten classmates memorialized on the Vietnam Memorial Wall. It will begin by reciting his Wall narrative followed by his write-up in the *40th Reunion Yearbook*. Any comments, thoughts, sea stories, etc. submitted by classmates will follow. As the accounts will be transcribed literally, readers will notice some redundancy among them. So be it!

And so, we initiate the series with classmate **King Cameron**.



Virgil K. Cameron, LTJG, USN, DoD: 29 July 66, Panel 9E, Line 85,

The Wall: LTJG Virgil K. Cameron was a U.S. Navy pilot assigned to Attack Squadron 155 (VA-155) aboard the USS CONSTELLATION. On July 29, 1966, LTJG Cameron was the wingman in a flight of 2 A-4E jets on an armed reconnaissance

mission over North Vietnam. At 9:25 AM. Cameron commenced a divebomb attack against a barge near Phu Dien Chau in Nghe Tinh Province. He made a low-angle dive with an entry altitude of 5000 feet. The flight leader was above Cameron's A-4E when it was hit by antiaircraft fire. The enemy fire was visible by flak puffs and the sound of automatic weapons audible as they fired. A stream of fuel came from Cameron's starboard wing about midway in his dive. The aircraft oscillated slightly and then began to roll left and burst immediately in a fireball. No ejection attempt or parachute was observed, nor was there a radio signal received by the flight leader. The flight leader searched the area thoroughly and saw only a burn spot on the ground where the aircraft impacted. Cameron's remains were not recovered and he was declared Missing in Action. During the time he was missing he was promoted to Lieutenant Commander. In September 1990, Cameron's remains were repatriated and positively identified in August 1999. He was interred at Arlington National Cemetery.

The Yearbook: When King walked onto the Academy grounds in the summer of 1960, he was not a young, raw recent high school graduate. After high school in McAllen, TX, he attended Schriner Military College for three years. The young man who strode across the Annapolis grounds that day was already trained in military ways and bearing. He walked erect; no, he marched up to Bancroft Hall.

As we plebes assigned to the 18th company, King Cameron was older and wiser than most of us. Yet in spite of having an enormous head start on those of us who were younger and greener, King used his experience and knowledge to help his peers. He tutored some in math, he showed others how to wear the uniform correctly, he taught us how to get a good spit shine on our shoes. As a roommate, King was quiet, thoughtful, and respectful and, consistent with his maturity, how to put others before ourselves.

When King was in High School, he flew for the Civil Air Patrol, having earned his pilot's license at the age of 16. Some classmate called him "Sky King." He loved flying and took to it naturally, so it was no surprise that upon graduating he received the Academy's Max Short Award in Aviation. Upon completion of flight training, he reported to VA-155, deployed

on the CONSTELLATION cruising off of Vietnam.

On 29 July 1966, King and his wingman were launched on a road reconnaissance mission. King spotted a train below and rolled in on it, the sky opened up on a rain of tracer bullets from anti-aircraft guns. He was hit and never pulled out of his dive. There was no ejection, no parachute. The aircraft flew into the ground trailing smoke.

The government of Vietnam returned the remains of a pilot later identified through DNA testing to have been King. He was interred in Arlington National Cemetery on 13 August 1999 with full military honors.

Ed Schoenberger, one of King's USNA roommates, sent in the following thoughts: "King was best man at our 6 June 1964 wedding. It was the last time I saw him. He was killed on his first patrol. I lost a good friend and we lost a great classmate."

"King had attended three years of college before coming to the academy and had obtained his private pilot's license. We were 18th company mates for 4 years and during that time we went to many Christian Fellowship meetings."

"One of my favorite King stories occurred as he was returning to the academy from Texas and was towing his motorcycle. While driving through Oklahoma he fell sleep and ran into the back of a watermelon truck. The motorcycle became unhitched and spun up the road in front of the truck. King woke up, got out of his car, walked up to the truck and found the farmer sitting in the road among all the debris holding his head crying out 'I killed him'. It took King several minutes to convince the farmer no one was hurt."

report: After many years of modest support and recognition, the City of Phoenix put \$3M in its FY 2024 budget to kick-start the Cold War Monument's construction, and I also agreed to become the project manager of the effort! An important, unique and aspirational part of the monument is its "museum-like" concept - i.e., its ability to tell a story/preserve history/and educate the public about the Cold War era (1946-1991) and the role submarines played in helping avoid a nuclear holocaust. The theme of the monument is "Learn, Honor, Remember" - Learn about the Cold War; Honor those military and civilian persons who served; Remember the lessons learned from our experience so they can be applied to our present day circumstances. The chief components for preserving history in our monument are the original parts of the nuclear-powered fast attack, LA class submarine named after the City of Phoenix, and the accompanying 25 "signposts" which contain information and content about both the Cold War and submarine life during that timeframe. My idea is our Class of '65's life experiences will be featured in the monument as perfect examples of military and civilian service during the Cold War Period, and our thoughts and feelings would be representative of those who lived during those tense times. 

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Sound the Last Post:

Robert (Bob) Prince died in Knoxville, in September. Most of the world knew Bob as an energetic and innovative problem solver, an engineer and entrepreneur whose leadership facilitated building a commercial industry to safely dispose of the world's nuclear waste. On a personal level, his family and friends witnessed his compassion, devotion, and commitment to those who filled his daily life. His life reflected his passion for his loved ones and his devotion to serving his country. After commissioning, he served in submarines. Then in civilian life, he focused his attention toward environmental stewardship and preservation for the nuclear industry. As President and CEO of Duratek, Bob led the research, development, and commercial deployment of new technologies that safely immobilized high-level radioactive materials. Management of such projects, he said "is often all about people," a belief he embraced throughout his career. In 1996, he was Maryland's Technology Entrepreneur of the Year and in 2004, The Catholic University conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Commercial Science, honoris causa. After his retirement from Duratek in 2006, Bob served as CEO of Gen4, providing overall technical leadership for the commercial development of the lead-bismuth eutectic Advanced Reactor. He was well known for his undying devotion to Janet, his wife of 52 years, and his passion for sailing, kayaking, hiking, and scuba diving. Through a blending of family, business, engineering, and leadership, Bob's life embodied the spirit of making this world a better place because he passed through. May he rest in peace knowing that he achieved that goal.

Capt Charles B. Fitchet USN, Ret, passed away suddenly in August. Chuck spent most of his Naval career flying and later working with the Joint Chiefs. After retiring, he went on to a second career with Raytheon. Chuck was a member of the Elks and the American Legion. His loved ones will always remember his kind and selfless nature, his humor and his unending love for family and friends. He was interred in the Crownsville (MD) Veterans Cemetery.

Other classmates who have recently passed include CDR Frank Baker Melson, USN and Robert Bennett Thompson, who passed in August and June respectively. Unfortunately, we have not yet found their obituaries.

Carl Weiscopf sent me the following special tribute. I have edited it sparingly for length.

™ "On Saturday, 5 August, my wife and life partner, Charlene, passed away peacefully in our home in San Diego after a short battle with cancer. 
Sort of ironic that with four USNA grads, we had to enlist the assistance of an Air Force guy.

Inductees from the 1972 team are: Shay Assad (Game Day Captain), George Berry, Dean Flatt, Gino Giannotti (Team Captain), Houston Jones, Ron Guilliams, Gary Hall, Chris Henry, Max Mills, Bob Musselman, Mike Richard, and Lathan Waters. Deceased team members: John Ault, Rich Been, Scott Borderud, Chuck Petrusch and Stevie Schmidt (Game Day Captain). Houston Jones (USNA '74) was the only underclassman on the A-side.

"Selected highlights achieved by our '72 Rugby Team were: A combined fall and spring season record of 43-1; National recognition as the #1 team in the East and #2 team in the US; Runner up at the 1972 National Collegiate Rugby Championships in a 16-team field with 3 wins and 1 loss; A & B side wins over Army; and a hard fought victory (with ABC Sports live coverage at USNA) over a Welsh team, undefeated in three years of international competition. The '72 Navy team, while long recognized for their athleticism and stamina, immensely benefitted from the coaching of LCDR Jake Backus, RN, and LT Gerald Purcell, RAN who brought strategic insight, tactics and intense training to our Rugby team.

"A centerpiece of the NRAA "With You" dinner following the induction ceremony (held 20 October but too late to be included in this column) will be Rich "Hondo" Been's "In Memoriam" induction into the Navy Rugby Hall of Fame. Hondo was a Classmate and teammate who distinguished himself by making the ultimate sacrifice for his country. dying in the line of duty, while serving on active duty. As soon as the 1971 USNA Football season ended, Hondo joined the Rugby team, quickly learning the game and earning a spot on the A-side playing the #8 (Lock) position in the scrum where he distinguished himself making an immediate impact with his leadership, athleticism, and determination. Hondo suffered a fatal carrier landing mishap in 1975 during flight operations off the USS Franklin D. Roosevelt (CVA 42), when the arresting cable inexplicably failed causing his F-4 to careen off the flight deck. He was unable to eject or escape from the cockpit."

Thanks to Gary, Shay and Gino for passing along this great information. Looking forward to seeing photos from the event back in October.


Jeff Beard provided the following regarding our Class's role with the dedication of the new Alumni Center on September 8th:

The Naval Submarine League recently announced their award selections for 2023. It was great to see our classmate, Vice Admiral USN (ret.,) Paul Sullivan (23rd Co.) was chosen to receive that organization's 2023 Distinguished Submariner Award.

Originally established in 1983 as the Submarine Hero Award, the annual award recognizes the personal contributions of a submarine qualified individual over his or her lifetime. His citation reads in part:

■ Paul E. Sullivan graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1974 and retired as a Vice Admiral in command of the Naval Sea Systems Command in 2008. Vice Admiral Sullivan's early career as a Surface Warfare Officer transitioned to Engineering Duty, where he focused on design and construction of Submarines. His waterfront assignments include project leadership in overhaul and repair at Norfolk Naval Shipyard and in new construction at Supervisor of Shipbuilding Groton, CT. At NAVSEA

Headquarters, VADM Sullivan served in "Team Submarine", becoming SEAWOLF Class Attack Submarine Program Manager and subsequently VIRGINIA Class Attack Submarine Program Manager, VADM Sullivan was selected to Flag rank in 2001 and served at NAVSEA as the Deputy Commander for Ship Design, Integration and Engineering, and finally as the COMMANDER of NAVSEA.

VADM Sullivan returned to the Navy as a civilian following his leadership position as the Executive Director of the Applied Research Laboratory, and Senior Scientist at The Pennsylvania State University (ARL Penn State). Prior to his time at ARL Penn State, Sullivan served as Vice President for Operations, and subsequently Chief Engineer and Vice President for the American Centrifuge Project at USEC Inc., a publicly traded corporation that sustained U.S.-based uranium enrichment for the commercial nuclear power industry. While at USEC, Sullivan led the development, design, construction, and test of a prototype enrichment cascade of American Centrifuge Machine technology in a joint USEC/DOE project.

Since March 2020, Paul Sullivan has served as a senior Navy civilian advising the leadership team that designs, acquires, builds, tests, and sustains submarines for the U.S. Navy. AUKUS is the historic tri-lateral pact between Australia, the United Kingdom, and the United States to produce a nuclear-powered submarine capability in Australia while ensuring the highest non-proliferation standards. Mr. Sullivan focused on the AUKUS Submarine Consultation period from 2021 to 2023 as the Navy's lead. Upon completion of the Consultation period, he became a senior advisor on AUKUS Submarine Safety, Acquisition, Design and Submarine Research and Development. He draws on his 34-year Naval career as an Engineering Duty Officer, from Project Management in the Nuclear Power industry, and from his R&D experience running a major Navy-affiliated laboratory.

VADM Sullivan will be recognized for this award on Nov. 8, 2023, at the Naval Submarine League Annual Symposium and Industry Update in Arlington, Va.

Classmates:

We, the Class of 1976, are an integral part of the 60,000 living graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy. We served our nation in the Navy and Marine Corps, some for a short time, others for a full career. Regardless of the length of time, we served. For the past couple of years, I've asked you to support the mission of the Naval Academy to train the next generation of Navy and Marine Corps leaders through our 50th Reunion Class Project. So far you have committed over \$2 million to our \$3 million goal. Thank you.

Fund raising, however, is but one measure of our support for the Naval Academy. There is a more direct way to support the Brigade: our mentorship of the Class of 2026 through the Another Link in the Chain program. This program ensures that the continuous chain of USNA graduates is strengthened by connecting older alumni to the class 50 years their junior, in our case the class of 2026.

I am proud to report that our class is leading the way to push the boundaries of that support. We were the first class to start our engagement with the junior class a full year ahead at NAPS. You showed up at nearly 50 "Welcome Aboard" events across the country to meet the new appointees in the spring before Plebe Summer and your presence at the Academy on I Day set the bar for other classes to follow. Thank you.

The Class of 2026 has responded to our support and have made their connection between our classes permanent: we are a part of their class crest with an older (and grayer) Poseidon holding a thunderbolt emblazoned with '76 on it.

We only have two events this year, but one is particularly significant, it is the "Bonds of Gold" ceremony next spring which provides an opportunity for members and families of our class to share part of our USNA "DNA" with 2026. We will present the Class of 2026 with class rings, miniatures, and pins donated by you and families of our deceased classmates to be melted down and incorporated into the gold used to create 2026's class rings thereby creating a lifelong physical bond between the two classes. The donations will also include any 100-year link rings from 2026 in the Alumni Association ring bank as well as donations from children of the classes of 1926 and 1951.

In April, the class officers will accept the donations from our class in a solemn "Bonds of Gold" ceremony in Memorial Hall. I attended the 1975/2025 "Bonds of Gold" ceremony last April. It was deeply moving, with families of the donors, or in the case of living donors, the '75 grad himself, speaking about the donor's time at USNA, their career, and what the Naval Academy meant to them.

We have already started to reach out to the families of our deceased classmates and are receiving some donations. Now comes the hard ask: Would you consider donating your ring to this? For most of us, the ring is nearly a part of our body, but for others it may be in a desk drawer having 'shrunk' over time. If not your ring, do you have that miniature or pin you gave your OAO or mom and now have once again? If your deceased father or uncle was a '51 grad, will you consider donating his ring? (On a personal note, my father was in the class of '52 and my family will donate his ring to the class of 77/27 "Bonds of Gold." I'll take dad's stone and place it in my ring.)

Some of you have already been contacted by me to make inquiries about the families of deceased classmates. The inquiries and any requests may be a very sensitive subject, and please do not feel any pressure, but if you know of a class widow who might consider donating her husband's class ring and/or her miniature, please feel free to contact either Mark Nesselrode or myself.

Our working deadline for making the donations is to have Mark Nesselrode receive them no later than 15 FEB 2024. Please notify Mark if you plan to donate an item.







CALL TO ACTION!

Though it has been many years since we all first raised our hand for that first oath of office, our service to country stays with us through the many years. I'm writing this article as a call to action. In 2021, I co-founded a defense related startup called nooks (www.nooks.works) to bring a true Classified-Spaces-as-a-Service (CSaaS) offering to market. Think subscription membership to a network of flexible access classified facilities (NISPOM, SCIF, SAPF) around the US for use by both industry and government customers. Whole bunch of reasons why we are doing this, but the bottom line is we (as a nation) need to be moving much faster to bring emerging technologies

into classified programs if we want to win the Great Power Competition we are currently engaged in. Access to classified infrastructure is a huge barrier-to-entry/scale to the classified marketplace for non-traditionals/small businesses /academia, and the lack of it is making us bleed talent from defense work on both the government and industry sides. Nooks is looking to dramatically reshape this infrastructure to make it affordable, available, and resilient (sounds like cloud... right?:-)).

We have an opportunity here to solve a real National Security problem, but I need your help to do so. If this problem set resonates with you, please reach out to me (sean@nooks.works). Most of our investors are Academy grads, we have an almost entirely veteran team, and we are about to scale like crazy. I want this opportunity open to my classmates in multiple ways, and I need the power of our collective experiences and networks to make this work. Reach out any time for more information, and thanks for being the best class to ever graduate from good ol' USNA!

Background on why we started this crazy company:

For me personally, after having the absolute privilege of flying F/A-18s during my active duty time, my last role before leaving the service in 2019 was standing up an analytics and innovation group called FRAG on the Air

Boss's staff (Naval Air Forces) on North Island along with Jarrod "Jrod" Groves (USNA '01). Basically, we were trying to find out how Naval Aviation (and other TYCOMs) can use AI/ML technologies to increase readiness and lethality through data driven decision making. Huge shoutout to RADM Jeffery "Caesar" Czerewko (USNA '90) and VADM (Ret) Dewolfe "Bullet" Miller '81 for the passion and forethought to start and support this initiative!

This role is what brought me into wider contact with the DoD innovation ecosystem, and it's where I met my two other co-founders: David "Mudd" Willard was an F-15 WSO + Pentagon Program Manager + early days at Defense Innovation Unit (DIU) in Silicon Valley, and Hunter Price was a White House civilian that helped stand up Defense Digital Services (DDS) and Kessel Run. Basically, all three of us were trying to get Tech companies into contracts, and the simple fact was that unless that company had a SCIF, they were simply not competitive for the classified marketplace (money/time/expertise barrier). We started nooks as a direct result of these experiences, so we bring a pretty unique lens to the problem (i.e. we aren't building SCIFs so we can build a widget, we are doing it to remove a barrier for small businesses / non-traditionals/academia + give the USG a resilient infrastructure that can scale based on market forces instead of the annual Congressional budget).

As of August '22, we are under contract with DoD to offer CSaaS to both industry and government customers. Our first three locations are Arlington, El Segundo, and Colorado Springs, but the vision is we have 100+ of these facilities around the US. At scale, this becomes the classified equivalent of remote work (we can't get you Top Secret internet at your house, but maybe we can get as close as your local Starbucks)! We are on the verge of our next round of DoD contracts, already have multiple non-traditional/dual-use technology companies signed up (before we've even opened our doors), and we are about to be operational at our first site in Arlington. It's been an absolute whirlwind of an experience, and we got this company off the ground based largely on the support from Service Academy graduates (feels like coming full circle).

If you or anyone in your network has experience in early-stage investing, commercial real estate, defense contracting, classified networks, Capital Hill, or security policy (something about Command, Citizenship, and Government comes to mind), this is a pretty cool opportunity to be involved in disrupting the status quo in the Defense/Intelligence marketplace!



Thought we would get back to USNA and what it meant to US, and some of the most vivid of our individual experiences. These are memories that were a Great Deal different than the lives that we had lived prior to USNA, which often could have been somewhat isolated, and except for team sports may have lacked significant Teamwork on a large scale. First from **Mike McLane** of the Great Class of '58

■ First some background. I had a cousin, **Jim Casse '54**, whose graduation I attended. His parents lived near Harness Creek, Annapolis area. My most vivid memory was THEIR final parade when the entire brigade marched off the parade ground and LEFT THEIR SHOES! It was all there in perfect company formation with company officer shoes in the correct spot - what a sight!

I figured that any group that could put together such a stunt with full participation must be something special. And they were.

Several years later when I was applying for an ROTC scholarship to U. of Wisconsin, I found out the USNA appointment tests were given a week or so ahead of the ROTC ones. How different could they be? I took both.

I came on 3rd. for USNA but aced the similar test and GOT the ROTC slot in Wisconsin. While working at a summer camp after high school graduation I received a telegram saying the guy who came in 1st was too short and the 2nd place was color blind. I should report in 3 days to accept the appointment. WHICH I DID.

Every time I marched on Warden field, I remembered the class of '54 prank and smiled.

My other memory about Plebe summer was when my mother received a box with ALL of my belongings in it. She took it quite hard, saying it was like I had died which, in a way, I had. I was the younger son and the last one to leave the nest. She got over it and, years later, enjoyed the graduation hosted by President Eisenhower. That man had the largest hands I've ever shaken!

I imagine that most all mothers would have had a similar shock when the Everything box or suitcase was received back home.

ROBERT RUSSELL DICKEY III '48

Colonel R.R. Dickey III, USMC (Ret.), passed away peacefully on 10 August 2023, surrounded by loved ones at his ancestral home, Wakefield Manor, in Huntly, VA.

"Robin" was born in Pau, France, to Robert Russell Dickey Jr. and Lelia Sinclair Gordon. He grew up in France, England and the United States, also spending summers during his youth in Canada, where he once rescued and raised two orphaned baby bears. The bears were later

donated to the National Zoo, and he reported visiting them years later and the bears recognizing him! He attended schools in England and the U.S., including St. George's School in Rhode Island, prior to USNA.

He joined the Naval Academy Class of 1948 in June of 1944 and was a member of the Third Company. Among other, more enduring accomplishments, he was known throughout Bancroft Hall for his ability to roll Bull Durham fixings into a perfect smoke using one hand.

Upon graduation, Robin attended the U.S. Marine Corps Basic School. As an infantry officer, he served in several combat zones in Korea (where he remained in the field despite a leg wound), and twice in Vietnam as a battalion commander.

It was while serving as 12th Company officer at USNA that he met his bride, Catharine "Kitty" Doolin (daughter of E.H. Doolin Sr. '20 and great-granddaughter of William Henry Willcox, USNA 1847, graduate #60). Following Annapolis, he was at MCB Quantico and then deployed to Paris, France, as the U.S. Marine attaché to NATO. Upon his return, he was based in Camp Pendleton, CA, followed by his first tour in Vietnam. He was next assigned to Headquarters USMC in Washington, DC, with another tour in Vietnam and back to Headquarters USMC. He ended his military career as Chief of Staff, MCB Quantico, VA.

Robin never stopped learning and served his "retirement" years (1974-2023) as a farmer, teacher, horseman, philosopher, poet and generous host at Wakefield Manor. There, he enriched the lives of family and friends, and was grateful as well for visits from fellow Marines for many years after his retirement.

Colonel Dickey was predeceased by his wife, Catharine Doolin Dickey in 2007. He is survived by their children, Catharine, Virginia and Rob; and grandchildren, Eliza and Caroline.

A family memorial service was held at on 14 October 2023 at the Wakefield Manor chapel, with burial immediately following at the Wakefield Manor cemetery. *

Commander Frederick R. Lafferty Jr., USN (Ret.), died on 7 July 2023, surrounded by his three loving daughters at his ranch north of Santa Rita, NM.

"Fred" was born on 31 March 1926, on the Presidio of San Francisco, CA, into a fourth-generation military family. After his appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy in 1944 and graduation in 1949, he married Elizabeth Louise Vissering in the chapel at the

Reporting to Commander Naval Air Pacific, Fred completed two cruises to Korean waters, flying TBMs and AFs aboard SICILY and BAIROKO. That was followed by an assignment with Air Transport

Squadron 5, where he assisted in the establishment of ComNavAirPac's first carrier-on-board delivery school, and three years of flight instructor duty at NAAS Kingsville, TX.

In 1957, Fred began training as a nuclear weapons supervisor at the Armed Forces Special Weapons School, Albuquerque, NM. That was followed by two shipboard tours in the Pacific and a temporary assignment with headquarters 13th Air Force, Clark Air Force Base, Philippine Islands.

Upon his return to the United States, he served a tour with VAW-11; a tour as special weapons officer at NAS Whidbey Island, WA; and as staff logistics officer for ComNav Marianas, Guam.

His final orders were to the Defense Atomic Support Agency (DASA) in Washington, DC, as head of the Nuclear Weapons Safety Division, from which he retired in 1969.

After a 12-year stay in El Paso, TX, the family's final move was to southwestern New Mexico, where Fred and Betty established a wildlife sanctuary on La Querencia Ranch.

Fred was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Betty; his parents, Colonel F.R. Lafferty, USA (Ret.), and Lucile G. Lafferty; and his sisters, Lucile Spurrier and Dorothy Ann Lee. He is survived by his daughters, Nancy Elisha of Aspen, CO, Linda L. Lafferty of El Jebel, CO, and Carey A. Lafferty of Santa Fe, NM; as well as seven grandchildren; ten greatgrandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews.

There were no services at his request. His remains were cremated and scattered with those of his wife on the mountains of La Querencia Ranch.

Born on 10 May 1928 to Dr. Roy and Florence (Lantz) Miller in Reynoldsville, PA, "Bob" graduated from Shamokin (PA) Area High School. He entered the Naval Academy by congressional appointment in 1947. He was on the 1949 national championship lacrosse team and graduated with the Class of 1951 as a member of the 11th Company.

Bob served on Wiltsie (DD-716) during the Korean War. After Submarine School, he had duty on Trumpetfish (SS-425), followed by the commissioning of Darter (SS-576). He was on the commissioning crew of John Marshall (SSBN-611), followed by command of Bang (SS-385). He capped his endeavors with 12 years as trustee and chairman of the board of Presbyterian Homes, Inc., serving the elderly in five states. He was an elder in the Presbyterian Church, a member of Lions Cubs International and a lifetime member of both the American Legion and the USNA Alumni Association.

His final 15 years were spent in Newville, PA, at Green Ridge Village in independent living, where he enjoyed many activities.

Bob will be remembered for his love of family and his deep Christian faith, with its joys from serving the people and communities around them. He enjoyed fishing, hunting, traveling, summering in Algonquin Provincial Park in Ontario, Canada and wintering in Tavares, FL.

Captain Robert H. Small, USN (Ret.), passed away on 23 August 2023. He was 94 years old. "Bob" was born on 20 February 1929 in Madison, IN, to George and Delight Small.

A 1951 graduate of the Naval Academy, Bob's first assignment was aboard K.D. BAILEY (DD-713) in Newport, RI, where he met his wife, Ensign Ruth Klein, USN. They were married in March 1953. Bob served aboard NORFOLK (DL-1), PILOT (AM-104) and attended

the Naval Postgraduate School. At MIT, he received a Master of Science degree in 1958. A staff tour with CruLant was next; followed by duty as navigator aboard Observation Island (EAG-154); and then XO aboard Abbot (DD-629).

After attending the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, KS, and serving in the CNO's office, Bob took command of DUPONT (DD-941) from 1966 thru 1969; firing over 30,000 rounds of 5-inch ammunition supporting U.S. Marines and Army units during two Vietnam tours. This was followed by a NATO tour with Standing Naval Force Atlantic; attendance at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces; and nuclear power training. Bob took command of TRUXTUN (CGN-35) in 1973 and headed back to Southeast Asia for PIRAZ duty in the Tonkin Gulf, followed by a nuclear refueling in Bremerton.

Heading back East in 1976, he soon became director of the Surface Warfare Systems Group at NavSea, until he retired from the Navy in 1981. Bob then began working in the defense industry. In 1988, he and Ruth moved to Annapolis and Bob returned to the Naval Academy to teach weapons and sailing to midshipmen. In 2007, Bob retired from USNA.

A very active classmate, Bob was extremely involved with his class board, including serving as class president from 2000-2003. He and Ruth organized reunions, sit down dinners and other class functions. Bob was very instrumental in obtaining the Class of 1951's support for the USNA Chapel's organ restoration and upgrade and supporting the USNA Museum's Gallery of Ships.

Bob's great enjoyment was spending time with family and friends, as well as traveling all over the world with Ruth on Cunard cruises, walking tours and sailing adventures.



One of nine books he published was entitled, Challenger's Shadow.

He entered the Nuclear Power Program in 1988, prepping for assignment as XO, THEODORE ROOSEVELT in 1990. After commanding DUBUQUE, he returned to ROOSEVELT as CO from 1994-1996. His final duty was as Head, Carrier Programs and Aviation Manpower and Training, Washington, DC.

After retirement, Rabbit joined Lockheed Martin in several influential posts, notably as Group MD, UKIS, in Chichester, England. Rabbit departed the LM warren in 2011, but he exited formal employment only, pursuing sporting activities, investments, golf, art and travel with the same zeal that made him an exemplary officer and executive. In 2013, he was baptized and confirmed in the Roman Catholic Church. He was a trustee
