

# Davids '89 Makes History as First Female Naval Academy Superintendent



Vice Admiral Yvette M. Davids '89, USN, was scheduled to take the reins as the 65th Superintendent of the Naval Academy in early January. Davids is the first woman to serve as Superintendent. She was preceded by acting Superintendent Vice Admiral Fred Kacher '90, USN. Kacher followed Vice Admiral Sean S. Buck '83, USN, who relinquished command on 29 August 2023.

Davids was nominated for the position on 21 April 2023 but a hold on military promotions

by Alabama Sen. Tommy Tuberville prevented Senate confirmation of more than 450 officers who were selected for promotion. That hold ended on 5 December 2023.

Vice Admiral Davids' promotion was approved on 5 December 2023. While her promotion was stalled, Davids served as acting commander of Naval Surface Forces and Naval Surface Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet.

Davids has been a barrier breaker throughout her naval career. She is a career surface warfare officer whose previous duties include commanding CURTIS, BUNKER HILL and Carrier Strike Group 11. Her assignment to CURTIS in support of operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom in 2007 made her the first Hispanic American woman to command a Navy warship.

In 1990, Davids began a three-year assignment aboard SAN JOSE, a combat stores ship deployed in support of operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. During that deployment, Davids was summoned from SAN JOSE to spend 10 days on BUNKER HILL. She had to get special permission to board the ship, which was located in a combat zone.

She served as executive officer of the destroyer HIGGINS during the initial combat operations of Iraqi Freedom. Twenty years after she first stepped aboard BUNKER HILL, Davids assumed command of the ship and served as air defense commander for the Carl Vinson Carrier Strike Group.

In June 2020, Davids assumed duties as chief of staff, U.S. Southern Command. She also served as commander, Nimitz Strike Group/Carrier Strike Group 11. Starting in August 2022 until August 2023, Davids served as director of the Learning to Action Drive Team.

Davids is a 2002 graduate of the Naval War College with a Master of Arts in National Security and Strategic Studies and a 2012 graduate of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces with a Master of Science in national resource strategy.

Ashore, she served as aide to the deputy and chief of staff, U.S. Pacific Fleet; as a joint exercise communications planner at the Joint Warfighting Center, Joint Forces Command (J6); deputy executive assistant to the deputy chief of naval operations for Information, Plans and Strategy (OPNAV N3/N5); director, Naval Academy Sailing, U.S. Naval Academy; executive assistant to the executive director of Commander, Naval Surface Forces Command; and assistant chief of staff for Requirements, Experimentation and Innovation (N8/N9) for the commander, U.S. Third Fleet.

Her first flag assignment was with the U.S. Department of State as the senior military advisor to the assistant secretary of state for political-military affairs prior to assuming Carrier Strike Group command.

Davids is married to Rear Admiral Keith Davids '90, USN, a Navy SEAL, and commander of Naval Special Warfare Command.



# Fair Winds, Following Seas to Smith '62

Admiral Leighton W. "Snuffy" Smith Jr. '62, USN (Ret.), passed away in his Pinehurst, NC, home on 28 November 2023.

Admiral Smith earned his Wings of Gold in 1964 and led a pivotal strike against the Thanh Hóa Bridge in Vietnam. He commanded air wings, major sea vessels and guided

multinational forces. He primarily piloted the A-4 Skyhawk and A-7 Corsair II light attack aircraft during his operational flying career. He served on multiple deployments to the Mediterranean Sea and North Atlantic, Western Pacific and Indian Oceans. His wartime service during the Vietnam conflict included three lengthy deployments and more than 280 combat missions.

Smith's major commands included the replenishment ship KALAMAZOO, aircraft carrier AMERICA and commanding Carrier Group Six as a flag officer. He logged more than 4,200 flying hours and accumulated more than 1,200 carrier arrested landings while flying multiple airframes throughout his career. With two Defense Distinguished Service Medals, the Navy Distinguished Service Medal, three Legion of Merit awards, two Distinguished Flying Crosses, two Meritorious Service Medals and 29 air medals, his dedication and heroism were consistently recognized.

Smith was a fierce advocate for the Naval Academy. He served as chair of the Board of Trustees for the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association for six years during the amalgamation of the Alumni Association and Naval Academy Foundation, and remained an active member until his passing.

He was selected as a Distinguished Graduate Award recipient in 2007. 

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# Aaron '88 at Center of Largest Student-run Special Olympics Event

Special Olympics of Pennsylvania's (SOPA) Fall Festival returned to Villanova University 3-5 November 2023. More than 1,000 athletes, 400 coaches and 5,000 volunteers representing the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania joined for what is the largest student-run Special Olympics event in the world.

SOPA provides year-round sports training and competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with intellectual disabilities,

# **2024 Distinguished Graduate Recipients Announced**

The 2024 United States Naval Academy Alumni Association Distinguished Graduate Award recipients were selected in December 2023. The following honorees will be celebrated in a ceremony at the Naval Academy on 22 March 2024.



### Admiral Dennis C. Blair '68, USN (Ret.)

Admiral Blair served in the Pacific for most of his 34-year Navy career. Several of his assignments took him outside the Navy—to the White House, the Central Intelligence Agency, the Joint Staff, a White House Fellowship and a Rhodes Scholarship. His final assignment was commander-in-chief, U.S. Pacific Command. Following retirement in 2002, he was the president of the Institute for Defense Analyses, then returned to government service as the

third director of National Intelligence. In recent years, he has played leadership roles in nonprofit organizations to address longstanding national security challenges—energy and manufacturing supply chain security, China's rise, ratification of the Law of the Sea Treaty and dysfunctional and polarized American politics. He has returned to the Naval Academy often since graduation, to lecture and lead advisory groups for the Superintendent. Admiral Blair resides in Durham, NC.



### Admiral Samuel J. Locklear III '77, USN (Ret.)

Admiral Locklear served 38 years as a nuclear-qualified surface warrior. Leading at the highest levels he served as commander U.S. Pacific Command, commander U.S. Naval Forces Europe and Africa, commander NATO Allied Joint Forces Command and commander Multinational Task Force Odyssey Dawn/NATO Operation Unified Protector in Libya. He commanded the NIMITZ Strike Group during Operation Iraqi Freedom, Destroyer Squadron

Two and LEFTWICH. He has steadfastly supported and championed the Naval Academy's mission. He served with distinction as the 1977 honor set brigade commander, the 19th Color Company officer and the 78th Commandant of Midshipmen. Following his retirement from active duty, he served as a USNA Foundation Athletic & Scholarship Programs trustee and as the chair, USNA Alumni Association Board of Trustees. Admiral Locklear resides in Milton, GA.



### Mr. Jerrold L. Miller '77

Miller served seven years as a surface warfare officer. Although he left active duty in 1985, he continuously served the Navy as an entrepreneur in the maritime industries, and the Naval Academy as a philanthropist. He co-founded a ship repair company with an Academy classmate, bought that company early on and sold it 25 years later after it became a leading U.S. Navy ship repair business. He then founded Fairlead Integrated,

a company dedicated to the revitalization of our shipbuilding industrial base and a critical supplier for aircraft carrier and submarine construction programs. As philanthropists, he and his wife, Laura, were instrumental in the establishment, funding and construction of the Uriah P. Levy Center, and they continue to be leaders in the development and growth of the Naval Academy's Margin of Excellence. He has been a member of the USNA Foundation Board of Directors since 2006 and currently serves as its vice chair. Mr. Miller resides in Virginia Beach, VA.



### Mr. John F. Young '78

Young began his naval career as a surface warfare officer, winning the Atlantic Fleet Shiphandler of the Year award twice, on two different ship classes. He has been a leader in the power generation and utilities industry for more than 40 years. More importantly, he has been an advocate of programs to promote science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) for underprivileged children of all ages throughout the country. His contributions have

led those students to appointments at the Naval Academy and other outstanding universities, where he has continued to support their education. He is a member of the Board of the USNA Foundation, a trustee of the USNA Foundation Athletic & Scholarship Programs, chairman of the board of Exelon Corporation and a member of the board of USAA. Mr. Young resides in Dallas, TX.

# Philadelphia Chapter Honors Webb '95

The Philadelphia chapter of the United States Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation presented the 2023 Shipmate of the Year Award to USNA AA&F President and CEO Jeff Webb '95, during the Chapter's Founders Day Dinner on 3 November 2023, at the Philadelphia Hilton.

The purpose of the Shipmate of the Year Award is to honor an individual or group for an outstanding contribution in support of the chapter mission—to serve and support the United States, the Naval Service and the Naval Academy. The chapter recognized Webb for his service as the AA&F

president and CEO, as well as for his efforts in co-founding Run to Honor, a nonprofit dedicated to perpetuating the memory of Naval Academy alumni lost in combat or training operations.

He was an elected trustee of the USNA Alumni Association (2011-17).

In addition to his prior service as an Alumni Association Trustee, Webb also served as a director of Students Run Philly Style, a nonprofit that trains and mentors high-risk high school youth through the completion of endurance running events.

# Sohovich Nutrition Center Dedication

The Sohovich **Nutrition Center was** officially dedicated on 10 November 2023 in Lejeune Hall. The fueling station, named for Athletic & Scholarship Programs Trustee and USNA Alumni Association and Foundation Board member, JoAnna Sohovich '93, is a supplemental resource for student-athletes. It was made possible

thanks to contributions from Women for Navy Athletics.

The center supports student-athletes who compete in Lejeune Hall and Halsey Field House. Its staff includes a full-time nutritionist, interns and assistants. Athletes can meet one-on-one with a nutritionist and prefuel prior to practice and refuel post practice.

Sohovich said in addition to supplementing King Hall meals, the center is a way to connect teammates and ensure they have the nutritional support they need. She attributed this endeavor coming to fruition to former Navy women athletes rallying around a common cause. This could just be the beginning for more refueling centers.

"Our vision is to have refueling stations at the location or in the vicinity of where every sport operates," said Sohovich, who was a cross-country and track and field athlete at the Academy.

# Martinez '11 Honored by Chesapeake Charities



Chesapeake Charities named Wild Kid Acres, created by Gerardo Martinez '11, as Maryland's Nonprofit of the Year on 16 November 2023, at the Chesapeake Bay Beach Club in Stevensville, MD. Wild Kid Acres is a 5-acre farm in Anne Arundel County featuring rescued animals. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Martinez family opened up their property to the public for community agriculture enrichment activities.

A rapid increase in demand for programming led Martinez to create Wild Kid

Acres in 2021. The farm now serves as an educational venue, a refuge for animal therapy clients and a place where inner city minority teens can meet a farmer who shares a similar background.

Chesapeake Charities commended Wild Kid Acres for educating and encouraging the next generation of farmers.

# CTE: The Silent Demon in Our Ranks



The Bushaks

Loved ones remember Andy Bushak '76 as a force of nature whose humor delighted his family, friends, teammates and shipmates.

Bushak was a star linebacker for the Naval Academy, earning All-American recognition as a first classman in 1975. He retired after five years of active duty, returning to

football in 1981 for a training camp tryout with his hometown Cleveland Browns. A knee injury spelled the end of his playing days, but Bushak found success as a commodities trader and consultant.

Mary Ann Bushak noticed significant changes in her husband's behaviors when he reached his early 50s. Bushak had stopped his once-regimented exercise routine, began to lose his temper easily and drank heavily.

Andy Bushak died in 2018, at age 63, due to liver and kidney failure related to years of heavy drinking. After a decade researching her husband's symptoms as his condition worsened, Mary Ann contacted the Concussion Legacy Foundation and chose to donate Andy's brain to the UNITE Brain Bank. Boston University researchers later diagnosed him with Stage 3 (of 4) chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE).

CTE is a post-mortem diagnosis manifested by distinctive degenerative changes in the brain, found at autopsy. The disease has been around for a long time—especially in collision sports like boxing, hockey, rugby and football—just not properly recognized.

For the past 20 years at the Naval Academy, there has been a robust program of collecting baseline scores on all athletes, with a detailed follow-up algorithm following a concussion. This includes a "return to learn" program for all student-athletes. Recently, the Academy participated in a four-year longitudinal study sponsored by the National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Department of Defense.

CTE can manifest in several other clinical and psychological conditions, including addictive behaviors, ALS, depression and suicide. There is no shortage of high-profile NFL deaths with CTE later listed as the cause. Unfortunately, the Naval Academy is also accumulating its own litany of deaths related to the disease. CTE is like hypertension, or high blood pressure: silent. Unlike hypertension, however, we do not yet have a way to measure CTE before death.

Mary Ann said the man she married was quite different from the man she ultimately lost. Mary Ann honors Andy's legacy by sharing his story, hoping to raise awareness about CTE and the resources available to families and caretakers as they experience the disease with a loved one.

"What I went through was hell, because there was nowhere to go," said Mary Ann. "If people aren't stuck where I was stuck, they can be made aware of resources that can potentially help them navigate this illness and provide a better level of support for their loved ones."

# WWII VETERAN ALUMNI SHARE WORDS OF WISDOM TO FUTURE GENERATIONS OF MIDSHIPMEN

ieutenant Commander William S.
Berkshire Jr. '45, USN (Ret.), absorbed many lessons through observation during his time as a newly minted ensign.

Berkshire and his classmates graduated early, on 7 June 1944, to join American forces in the battle against the Axis Powers in World War II. His first post-commissioning assignment was to a supply depot in Bayonne, NJ. He was ordered to a destroyer where he was the supply and disbursing officer. As an ensign, he was commissioned as paymaster.

During the lead up to his deployment to what would be the Battle of Leyte Gulf, also known as the Second Battle of the Philippine Sea, Berkshire was committed to learning how his new shipmates conducted business. He modeled his behavior after theirs.

For future junior officers preparing to commission into the fleet or Marine Corps from the Naval Academy, Berkshire offers simple, yet sage advice.

"Watch your peers, your rank or slightly more senior, to see how they do," said Berkshire, a Los Gatos, CA, resident whose career as a Supply Corps officer included service during the Korean War.

Berskshire and three of his fellow Naval Academy alumni shared words of wisdom for future generations of midshipmen. Their lives of service continued beyond World War II and their time in uniform.

Lieutenant Commander Charles G. Sobel '45, USNR (Ret.), has faithfully worn his ring since his Ring Dance. It is a reminder of the incomparable education he received and the opportunities it has afforded him. He attributes much of his success in uniform and in the insurance industry to the rigorous academic and military instruction he received in Annapolis.

The 100-year-old New Jersey resident served in volunteer service roles until

age 99. Sobel said the Naval Academy's structure positions junior officers on the path to success.

"The discipline and the value of following the rules followed me the rest of my life," said Sobel, who served in the submarine community. "Learn as much as you can and follow the rules. The rules are pretty much the same (in the fleet).

"Everything I learned at the Academy put me in good stead for civilian life."

Commander Russell Dawson Taylor'46, USNR (Ret.), grew up watching ships and sailors from his hometown of Virginia Beach, VA. He was enamored by Navy service and his path was set the day an older cousin took him aboard his cruiser.

It took Taylor multiple attempts to earn his place among the Brigade of Midshipmen, including a year at the Cochran-Bryan Preparatory School in Annapolis. This came after spending his senior year in high school as a member of the Navy Reserve.

Determination and perseverance were rewarded when Taylor entered the Academy with the Class of 1946. His class graduated early, on 6 June 1945. Taylor was aboard the Essex-class aircraft carrier Hancock in Yokosuka Harbor on 2 September 1945. He leaned over the ship's railing to witness the surrender of the Japanese Empire, which occurred aboard Missouri.

Taylor said working hard to get into the Naval Academy gave him a greater appreciation for the institution. He was sure to maximize his opportunity. He said the friends he made and the leadership skills he learned while in Annapolis were the two most enduring elements of his time at the Naval Academy.


"I felt a great responsibility not to let down those who had supported me," said Taylor who celebrated his 100th birthday in 2023. "That applied to school,

my service in the Navy and what I chose to do afterwards."

# **'STEP UP AND DO YOUR JOB'**

Captain Jack Gillooly '45, USN (Ret.), is the oldest living former Navy football player at 103-years-old. He credits his time at the Naval Academy for instilling in him the values and lessons needed to serve and lead others. Gillooly encourages midshipmen to soak up all the knowledge they can in Annapolis. He said the basic duty of following orders and fulfilling your job requirements goes a long way toward building trust with shipmates.

While not every moment may seem critical, being a dependable shipmate is essential to the team's success, Gillooly said.

"Learn all you can learn. It will be of use to you when you get to the fleet. Don't just push things aside. Learn what you can, it will be easier later," said Gillooly, who served aboard COLUMBIA in the Pacific Ocean during World War II and was a naval aviator during the Cold War.

"Do what you're told to do at the Academy, you're going to have to do that when you get to the fleet anyway."

Gillooly said the Academy experience puts midshipmen under stress for a reason. The ability to perform under duress is an invaluable skill, he said.

"That prepared us," Gillooly said.
"You're under stress when you get aboard
a ship particularly if you get in battle.
You better be able to control your
emotions. A little bit of that at the Naval
Academy will help prepare you."

His advice for the Naval Academy's future junior officers is to follow the last

order. He said training at the Academy can't give new officers a full taste of what they will experience in the fleet but it does give them a preview of what to expect post commissioning.

"Nothing can really give you the flavor of the fleet, you have to be with the crew," said Gillooly, a two-way tackle for Navy's 1942 and 1943 football teams. "You have to get to know the feel of the crew and people you are serving. I joined a veteran battle-hardened crew when I came aboard COLUMBIA. They had been through some of the epic sea battles and landings at Guadalcanal, in the Solomons. Your first tour aboard ship, is going to be a big learning curve."

During the Battle of Leyte Gulf, Gillooly was an ensign manning the light cruiser COLUMBIA's forward 5-inch director. He survived one of the earliest Japanese kamikaze attacks.

Gillooly said learning to control your emotions during times of high stress and anxiety is paramount to doing your job effectively.

"You're trained to do a job, you must control your emotions," said Gillooly, who lives in Tallassee, TN. "You can't let that get in the way of your job. Just step up and do your job. Those guys that are right with you are doing their jobs. If you don't do your job, they don't think much of you.

"Each of you has a different part of this puzzle. You're relying on your shipmates to do their jobs. Your life is dependent on that, so you damn well better do your job."

# NATIONAL WWII MUSEUM FULFILLING SACRED MISSION TO HONOR, MEMORIALIZE THE GREATEST GENERATION

An SBD-3 Dauntless launches off Enterprise's deck. A few seconds later, another Navy dive bomber joins the hunt for Japanese Zeroes.

Soon, they'll engage their Axis counterparts in firefights during the Battle of Midway. Their mission is perilous but pivotal. The United State's naval warfare innovation after the attack on Pearl Harbor helped turn the tide against the Japanese. Success in naval aviation proved to be a critical component in the U.S.'s victory in the Pacific Ocean theater during World War II.

This development is spotlighted in the National World War II Museum's Road to Tokyo exhibit. The New Orleans, LA, museum's immersive displays insert visitors into the action. The Road to Tokyo exhibit includes a display replicating Enterprise's flight deck. Images of planes barreling off the carrier headed for aerial combat flicker off a floor-to-ceiling video screen. Three momentous naval actions—the Doolittle Raid, Coral Sea and Midway—are highlighted in the carrier exhibit. The contributions of the submarine community are also memorialized in this area.

Naval Academy alumni are featured prominently in the museum's documentation of the Pacific campaign. The stories of less-heralded heroes such as Rear Admiral Wade McClusky, USN, Class of 1926; Rear Admiral Robert Dixon, USN, Class of 1927; and Vice Admiral Charles Lockwood, USN, Class of 1912; are intertwined within the exhibit with familiar names—Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz, USN, Class of 1905; Fleet Admiral William Halsey Jr., USN, Class of 1904; and Fleet Admiral Ernest King, USN, Class of 1901.

Jeremy Collins, the museum's director of conferences and symposia, said the exhibits, which also include the Road to Berlin, were intentionally crafted to give visitors a glimpse of the environments and conditions sailors, soldiers, aviators and Marines faced during the war.

"As you walk through our European gallery, you'll walk through the Atlas Mountains of North Africa or the forests of the Ardennes during the Battle of the Bulge," Collins said. "In our Road to Tokyo exhibit, you'll be on the deck of Enterprise and watch actual footage from the Battle of Midway. In the Guadalcanal exhibit, you have the canopy of trees hanging over you.

"We want to give people a sense of what they were seeing and hearing during their experiences overseas."

The museum celebrates and memorializes the Greatest Generation from Medal of Honor recipients who made the ultimate sacrifice to the courageous citizen soldiers who volunteered to defend liberty. The Naval Academy Alumni Association and



Foundation is partnering with the National World War II Museum to deliver exclusive WWII-themed travel offerings this year.

The travel programs include WWII in the Philippines (16-24 March), D-Day 80th Anniversary Cruise (29 May-8 June), Easy Company (25 June-7 July), Italy 1944 (7-13 October) and the Battle of the Bulge (11-19 December). One of the museum's missions is preserving the stories from WWII to ensure future generations understand and appreciate the service, sacrifice and leadership exhibited by Americans during World War II.

"One of the best ways to really learn about it, other than coming to the museum,



is to go to these battlefields and sites," Collins said. "We're delighted to have the partnership with the United States Naval Academy Alumni Association to get some of you down here or overseas. When it's alumni groups, it's always great because they always come with a sense of mission that matches our mission at the museum.

"When you're going through on our tours, you'll hear from these individuals either read their words or hear their accounts through our oral histories but you'll also visit those sites and pay your respects at the cemeteries and visit the memorials to these units and to the men and women who served."

# Honoring and Preserving Legacies

From King to Nimitz to the 28 alumni who were awarded the Medal of Honor for their service in World War II, the Naval Academy's impact on the war is undeniable. The museum includes an interactive exhibit on the Balao Class submarine Tang which was under the command of Lieutenant Commander Richard O'Kane '34, USN. Tang sank 33 Japanese ships during five war patrols including 13 ships in its final patrol.

Each visitor to the TANG exhibit is given the name of an actual submariner on the final patrol. They are assigned a post and through audio and video elements experience what the crew's final moments might have been like. At the end of the experience, visitors learn whether their submariner survived.

Lieutenant Colonel John Curatola, USMC (Ret.), military historian at the Jenny Craig Institute for the Study of War and Democracy at the National World War II Museum, said while it's impossible to replicate the harrowing conditions of war, the museum seeks to deliver an experience that goes beyond dates and names.

"You try to get a sense of what it must have been like," Curatola said. "We do the best we can to try to give you an understanding of these environments and how difficult they were to operate in."

The National World War II Museum features six buildings including the Liberation Pavilion which opened in November 2023. The museum was originally launched on 6 June 2000 as the D-Day Museum. New Orleans was home to Higgins Industries, which produced more than 20,000 Higgins Boats that were


used in amphibious landings during WWII. The museum has grown exponentially over the past two decades and welcomed nearly 5 million visitors in 2022.

The exhibits include restored WWII aircraft in the U.S. Freedom Pavilion and The Boeing Center's George H.W. Bush Aviation Gallery. That space houses a B-17 Flying Fortress, an SBD Dauntless and a P-51 Mustang. That hall also features a Medal of Honor Wall and interactive kiosk that allows visitors to search for honorees by branch of service, home state and a particular battle. Each honoree's citation is available to read.

"One thing we want to do at the museum is bring it back to that average service member who is the one who won the war for us," Collins said.

The museum's commitment to document the contributions and sacrifices of all Americans—from the Marines who landed on Guadalcanal to the millions of women who entered the workforce for the first time—is evident in the more than 10,000 personal oral history accounts of veterans, eye witnesses to the war and Holocaust survivors.

"We recognized the responsibility to make sure these stories—from both the great leaders and commanders and the individual citizen soldiers that joined up after Pearl Harbor or were enlisted prior to that—that they don't get forgotten," Collins said.



Curatola is the son of an Air Force officer and his daughter works as a foreign service officer. He said preserving this history is important, "not just for our generation but more importantly for future generations."


"Democracy is always under pressure, it is our job to maintain it," Curatola said. "If not, you can have a repeat of what happened in German in 1933, Italy in the 1920s and the same with Japan."

# Alumni Influence

The backbone of naval leadership in WWII came from the Naval Academy, Collins said. Curatola attributed the Allies' victory, specifically the U.S.'s success in the Pacific to the agility and innovation of the American Navy. Despite losing most of its battleships during the attack on Pearl Harbor, the U.S. possessed its arsenal of aircraft carriers.

America transitioned to aviation becoming the primary striking component, Curatola said. He said several Naval Academy alumni were serving as admirals during the war and

were responsible for developing America's ability to strike back at Japan's navy via aviation. Previously, aviation was used to scout where the enemy fleet was or to spot for naval surface forces.

Nimitz, who served as commanderin-chief, U.S. Pacific fleet, changed that.

"What (Nimitz) understands is the striking power of aviation carries a lot more lethality than it had before," Curatola said. "Nimitz is one of the people who recognizes this. He is instrumental in developing these fast carrier task force groups that are instrumental in taking on the Japanese navy."

Through maps and displays, the war in the Pacific is chronicled in detail through the Road to Tokyo exhibit. The actions by Fleet Admiral Halsey and Admiral Raymond Spruance, USN, Class of 1907, proved pivotal. Halsey engineered the hit-and-run raids on the Gilbert, Marshall and Wake Islands in early 1942 as the United States rebounded from the losses at Pearl Harbor.

Spruance earned accolades for leading Task Force 16 with two aircraft carriers during the Battle of Midway.


"To take the carriers he has and sink four Japanese aircraft carriers in one battle, basically shifts the entire Pacific from America being on the defensive to taking an offensive approach as early as June 1942," Curatola said. "You see these officers stepping up and embracing change in terms of naval aviation and naval warfare."

Curatola said Naval Academy alumni demonstrated their ability to integrate new technology and warfare tactics. They realized some strategies at play in Europe were not applicable in the Pacific.

The training and experiences at the Academy, enabled these alumni to adjust their orders to the new realities of war.

"It required different approaches and methodologies," Curatola said. "This takes time. It isn't just like a switch you flip. The United States and her allies learned exponentially faster than the Axis.

"The Germans, the Japanese and the Italians are constantly losing because they're not as adaptive and not as innovative. They don't have the equipment sets that the United States brings to the fight and the ability to coordinate all those equipment sets. It's not just that we have more stuff, it's how the Americans use it, coordinate it and project it over two oceans."

shoulders in their crisp NJROTC uniforms, high school students—and prospective Naval Academy applicants—maintain eye contact with the men and women whose path they'd like to follow to Annapolis. Alumni are peppered with questions about their experiences at the Academy.

These high-achieving, service-oriented teenagers seek advice as they begin their own quest to join the Brigade of Midshipmen. Nearby, pensive parents nod. They're absorbing information and first-hand accounts from experts whose links to the Naval Academy range from the Classes of 1956 to 2018.

Nearly 200 attendees gathered at Feather Sound Country Club in Clearwater, FL, on 11 October 2023. The Tampa Bay chapter of the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation's annual Founders' Day Dinner attracted 80 prospective applicants and almost three dozen alumni.

While the event celebrated the Academy's 178th anniversary, the chief mission of the dinner is pitching the benefits of a Naval Academy education. Members of each warfare community shared their personal experiences at the Academy and in the fleet or Marine Corps. Each table included at least one alumnus who provided instant feedback to the prospective applicants or their parents.

The Tampa Bay chapter has hosted this meaningful community outreach offering in its current form since 2007. Warren Hahn '60 informally started the Tampa chapter in 1972 and it was formally recognized in 1977. It was Hahn who recognized greater engagement with the community via the Founders' Day Dinner



could have a significant impact. The chapter works in partnership with the Academy's admissions office, Blue and Gold Officers and local schools to deliver guidance to identify and aid prospective applicants.

Tampa Bay Chapter President Commander Jane Lochner '84, USN (Ret.), said hearing from alumni about their journeys is an invaluable opportunity for students and their parents. The chance to separate fact from fiction and to get insight about life in the Brigade and from each warfare community can help alleviate anxiety during the application process.

It's a service Lochner would have appreciated as a high schooler.

"This is not only for the students but for the parents to understand what their child is going to get into and what it means to be in the Navy and in a warfare area," said Lochner, who is in her first year as president of the Distinguished Chapter. "I had no clue coming into the Naval Naval Academy alumni sing "Navy Blue and Gold" during the Tampa Bay chapter's 2023 Founders' Day Dinner on 11 November 2023. Almost three dozen alumni attended the event and engaged with prospective Naval Academy applicants.

Tampa's Founders' Day Dinner is just one example of local chapters delivering impactful support to their local alumni and the Academy. Across the country, chapters are supporting the Academy's mission office, BGOs, assisting the parents of future and current members of the Brigade, honoring fallen alumni and providing business and career networking events. These efforts include STEM events for middle schoolers, hosting Run to Honor events and supporting midshipmen during summer training and Navy athletes when they are in their areas.

Marcia Daubenmire and her daughter, Elizabeth, were among the attendees at the Tampa Bay chapter's Founders' Day Dinner. They learned the importance of not only having great grades and being involved in extra-curricular activities, but to seek out leadership positions in those endeavors.

"If you're the best of the best, that's who they're looking for," Marcia Daubenmire said.

Elizabeth, a high school junior, said she got a lot of information about the variety of careers available to Naval Academy alumni. She also appreciated hearing from Lieutenant Commander Janel T. Brown '97, USNR (Ret.), that a life of service doesn't mean sacrificing a family.

Brown, an executive with Microsoft who served in the Reserve, is married to a former Navy SEAL and they were able to remain in uniform while raising children. Elizabeth Daubenmire also liked hearing from recent Academy graduates.

"Recent graduates can give you the most up-to-date information," she said.

Brian Tsai '16 said events such as the Founders' Day Dinner are designed to showcase the support Naval Academy alumni and families can expect once they take their oaths on I-Day. Partnering with BGOs and parent clubs helps strengthen these ties, he said.

The goal is to deliver "360 degrees of support," Tsai said. The Tampa Bay chapter's

offerings also include an annual Spring Picnic, which drew more than 100 high school students and their families in 2023.

"Becoming a midshipman is not like a student at any civilian school," Tsai said. "You're entering a brotherhood and sisterhood where you rely on everyone else even on the family side. You have support for the parents, support for fellow alumni and current midshipmen."

"We want to show them that we are here for them. At this chapter, we fully embrace that."

# **Harnessing Passion**

Tampa Bay's chapter isn't alone in its impressive efforts to serve its local community as well as supporting fellow alumni. The Greater Washington, DC, chapter has experienced significant growth in recent years thanks, in part, to a commitment of providing a robust and varied schedule of events.

By harnessing the passion and energy of its members, the DC chapter has earned Distinguished Chapter status and become a model of extraordinary service. The chapter has more than 600 active members after dipping to about 60 five years ago.

Central to that membership rebound is offering events appealing to different demographics. The chapter's outreach efforts include:

- · Midshipmen mentoring
- Summer picnic to welcome incoming plebes
- Naval Academy candidate event at George Mason University
- Joint Service Academy Business Network meetings

During the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Greater Washington, DC, chapter offered the event virtually, which drew interest from students across the country. They've retained that option in the ensuing years.

"It's really increased our contact footprint," Calandra said. "On the flip side, we are redoubling our efforts this year to answer the diversification call of the former Superintendent, Vice Admiral Sean S. Buck '83, USN (Ret.), to get better representation from our DC inner city candidates."

These outreach and engagement efforts extend to alumni transitioning to the civilian sector. Calandra said they answer this call by supporting the Service Academy Career Conference (SACC). One of SACC's four annual locations is in Washington, DC.

"We fully support the SACC events but go beyond that with networking socials and other events to connect our transitioning alumni to private industry and to transitioned alumni who are poised to lend a helping hand," Calandra said.

Calandra said helping alumni navigate the complex and confusing health care maze is also a priority for the chapter.

"I think we have finally cracked the code to get the expert VA health care rep to provide us a seminar and video on how to navigate the VA health care system and for those of us who paid a little higher price, the Veterans Disability pathway," he said.

Ingrid Peterson '01, a DC chapter member who led a running group during the pandemic, said inspired members were the impetus for ramping up a schedule that attracted more alumni to participate.

"You have to believe in the events you're going to offer," Peterson said. "We have people take on things they're really passionate about. That has really been the key to our success." Buy-in from members is central to getting new events up and running, said Captain Shelby Mounts '92, USN (Ret.). Mounts served as the chapter's outreach and engagement officer as membership began to grow.

He said providing a variety of events is critical to engaging a wide swath of alumni.

He advises leaders of other chapters seeking to revamp their offerings to "give a little control and let the members who have an idea run with it." Mounts said consistent communication is imperative as is listening to "the voice of your area alumni, not just existing members."

"If you spend the little bit of volunteer goodwill you have going off and doing things the chapter doesn't want to support, that's a recipe for disaster," Mounts said at a 16 November 2023 event hosted by Bo & Ivy Distillery, which is co-owned by Commander Michael Curcio '01, USN (Ret.). "The board leadership has to be willing to do the work. That gets people excited that they're going to see their friends and classmates and do something fun."

Mounts said his chapter is open to sharing the blueprints for their events—along with the barriers they faced—with other alumni association chapters. That spirit of cooperation permeates the chapter community.

# 'Share the Gouge'

Leadership of the Hampton Roads chapter echo that sentiment. President Commander Renee Reedy '81, USN (Ret.), said her chapter is happy to "share the gouge" of a successful event to her peers across the country.

Chapter Webmaster Major Rob Aeschbach '90, USMCR (Ret.), encourages other chapters to exchange notes regarding their events and programs with their peers to help broaden their offerings. He said Hampton

"If they're doing something interesting that we can emulate, why not try?" Aeschbach said.

Hampton Roads, which was named a Distinguished Chapter in 2023, engages its densely populated alumni community with a mix of events and programs aimed to support, inform and assist alumni throughout their life's journey. This includes:

- Hosting local incoming plebes, foundation scholars and family members during the 30th annual Plebe Recognition Dinner in June 2023
- An October 2022 networking breakfast featured Captain Ken Levins '83, USN (Ret.), eastern region director for the Virginia Department of Veteran Services, who provided an update on VA health care and benefits
- On 29 June and 27 July 2023, hosted groups of midshipmen in the area for Summer Training at Naval Information Forces Command
- Run to Honor (see accompanying story on page 22)
- · Monthly business networking events

Captain Al Ponessa '68, USN (Ret.), events committee chair for the Hampton Roads chapter, said the annual dinner for incoming plebes draws about 170-200 attendees. Previous guest speakers at the event include deputy commander of U.S. Fleet Forces Command Vice Admiral James Kilby '84, USN, who was nominated as the next vice chief of naval operations; approved December 2023.

Attendees can also connect with other alumni as they prepare for I-Day.

"They get a chance to hear from alumni who were once in the same position they're in now," Ponessa said. "It's a great opportunity for alumni to give back and for the future plebes to understand they have the support of the local alumni community."

Reedy said providing events and programs that serve a diverse alumni population is essential. While some more recent alumni might gravitate toward business development or networking breakfasts, retirees might seek out informational speaker series and others might be attracted to legacy events such as the Run to Honor program.

"We try to offer something for everyone," Reedy said.  $\mathring{\boldsymbol{\bot}}$

# **ALUMNI EMBRACE SOLEMN DUTY OF PRESERVING** FALLEN CLASSMATES' LEGACIES By Sandy Spadaro

very name on the wall in Memorial Hall has a story, belonging to a man or woman whose ■ purpose was serving their country.

When Naval Academy alumni fall in the line of duty, their classmates, teammates, company mates and fellow alumni have an earnest desire to share their story and ensure those who make the ultimate sacrifice are honored in perpetuity. This is etched in granite in Memorial Hall, but many alumni have stepped up to honor the legacy and sacrifice of their fallen comrades through the Run to Honor program.

Captain Steve Swift '87, USNR (Ret.), has five classmates in Memorial Hall. He is president of the Run to Honor Shared Interest Group, which unites alumni, friends and family around the solemn goal of memorializing and honoring fallen heroes.

Swift's personal connection fuels his Run to Honor efforts. He said Captain Brian Bourgeois '01, USN, had a "triple impact" on him. Bourgeois was a Blue and Gold Officer (BGO) in Tampa Bay (2007-2019) and was commanding officer of SEAL Team 8 when he was lost during a training accident on 7 December 2021. He was a triple loss for Swift, who worked with Bourgeois as a BGO volunteer, with the Navy Seal Foundation and with Run to Honor. Swift swims for the Navy SEAL Foundation in the Tampa Bay Frogman SEAL Swim each year.

"Run to Honor is getting the awareness out there," said Swift, who has helped organize Run to Honor events with the Naval Academy Alumni

Association and Foundation's Tampa Bay chapter. "It's personal. We memorialize their sacrifice and service. We honor them, all 2,700 on the wall in Memorial Hall."

For the Naval Academy community, the loss of a classmate or alumnus is a deeply felt blow. These individuals have dedicated their lives to the service of their country, and their sacrifice demands more than mere recognition from the federal government. It demands a deeper level of remembrance and honor, a testament to the impact they have had on their alma mater and the wider world. It requires a response from classmates.

Run to Honor brings together alumni to remember stories, heroism and families. The Run to Honor program was established by the Class of 1995. Classmates from '95 wanted to honor three classmates who made the ultimate sacrifice during the Global War on Terror.

The Marine Corps Marathon, held every year in Washington, DC, was a well-established event, and partnering seemed a logical connection. This gave families and classmates a gathering point to remember sacrifice and service. Since 2007, many Alumni Association chapters have hosted events around the country, often during Memorial Day weekend.

Connections and links to the Academy motivate Run to Honor supporters like Swift.

"I did not know them all personally, but one story that is very personal to me is Lieutenant Commander

Ron Vauk '87, USNR, because he was a submarine officer like I was," Swift said. "Ron switched to intelligence in the Reserve and he was on his second day of his two weeks of active duty on 9/11 at the Pentagon. So, it could have very easily been me and he just happened to be at the wrong place at the wrong time."

# 'Remembering the Stories of the Fallen'

Dave Paddock '77, former Run To Honor president, was asked to help spread the word to other classes while serving on the Alumni Association Board of Trustees Communications Committee. The night before the 2007 Marine Corps Marathon, families and classmates gathered for a dinner to remember and honor the fallen. After a few years the dinner became part of a separate program—Honor Our Fallen Heroes.

The Hampton Roads chapter hosts a sunrise Run to Honor at the Virginia Beach waterfront each year.

"Run to Honor is to honor USNA grads," Paddock said. "It's not about us getting a t-shirt for the run; it's about talking with the families and remembering the stories of the fallen.

"We want to honor through run, bike or swim. Honoring our fallen, that's the main thing."

Run To Honor continued to be a popular off-shoot at the Marine Corps Marathon as Naval Academy alumni honored graduates including Major Megan M. McClung '95, USMCR; Lieutenant Travis Manion '04, USMC; and Lieutenant Brandon Looney '04, USMC. Meanwhile, other Run to Honor events began to appear around the country at Alumni Association chapters, hosting their own 10Ks, marathons or walks, bringing together classmates and families to reminisce and honor fallen classmates.

When a Naval Academy graduate falls in the line of duty, their legacy is not confined to the walls of their alma mater. It extends to their families, their friends and the countless lives they have touched. It is a legacy that deserves to be honored and cherished, not just for a day or a year, but for generations to come.

Memorial Hall at the Naval Academy is a sacred and reverent place for remembering and honoring alumni who were lost in service to their country. To make the Bancroft Hall site accessible to all, Virtual Memorial Hall (www.usnamemorialhall.org) was created by Pat McConnell '02. The website features the biography of fallen classmates, *Lucky Bag* entries and remembrances from Gold Star family members.

Run To Honor hosted a Facebook Live reading of all 2,700 names at Memorial Hall on Memorial Day 2023.

### Row to Honor

In recent years, honoring fallen heroes has evolved to include Row to Honor. Commander Richard Cataldi '69, USN (Ret.), a member of the Oak Ridge-Knoxville chapter, said the Row to Honor program began with a few midshipmen on spring break. In 1999, Captain Jackson B. Richard '52, USN (Ret.), (also known as Captain Jack), arranged for the lightweight crew team to come to Oak Ridge/Knoxville, TN, during spring break for team practice.

Richard organized host families for about 20 midshipmen and coaches. Cataldi said families were thrilled to host the team and coaches. They enjoyed the interaction with the midshipmen, he said.

On the last day of practice, the "Broken Oar Award" is given to the winning team after the last race. The award was renamed "Captain Jack Spring Regatta Award." Following the COVID-19 pandemic, the team now arrives on two Navy buses for the spring practice.

"Two members of the chapter are former rowers," Cataldi said. "With Run to Honor being successful it seemed like Row to Honor gave another opportunity for the mids to honor fallen heroes."

In the ensuing years, the program grew, from 40 to 60 midshipman. Midshipmen made their own travel arrangements on their personal time to practice and honor Naval Academy alumni who were killed in action or in operational losses.

COVID curtailed the event in 2020, cancelling travel plans for all midshipmen. However, once restrictions were lifted the following year, Naval Academy buses were used to take the lightweight crew team to Oak Ridge-Knoxville area for practice, with host families providing lodging.

Row to Honor brought together the Naval Academy community and the community of families in the Oak Ridge-Knoxville area. The program has been a success and helped the Oak Ridge-Knoxville chapter earn the Distinguished Chapter Award. 🕏



# FIVE MINUTES WITH...

# STEVEN LE '98

This feature spotlights the extraordinary things being done by alumni in the Navy and Marine Corps and their unique, impactful achievements in the private sector and in their communities. Please send suggestions to jimmy.debutts@usna.com.

Steven Le '98 visited all 50 states—sometimes crashing on couches—cooking dinner for his fellow Americans to gather their stories. Over the course of three years, Le prepared 259 meals in 157 different towns and cities. He met and listened to more than 1,500 people's stories.

Le, a middle school humanities teacher, plans to publish a book featuring the stories. After serving in the Special Operations community following his commissioning, he has served as a high school English literature teacher, founded and directed an educational nonprofit, and directed operations for a startup manufacturing company. He recently shared details of his nationwide travels with *Shipmate*.

Shipmate: What inspired you to launch your journey?

Le: Before the Le Mobile Feast (LMF) journey, I had visited 44 states and lived in seven, so I thought I knew the heartbeat of our country. The summer of 2015 and the vitriol that I heard in the public discourse persuaded me otherwise. I wondered how we got to this degree of divisiveness, and it was apparent then that there were at least two contradicting versions of the United States. The best way to answer this large question, I realized over time, was for me to go out and listen to people and to do it where they lived. By that November, I'd devised the idea to offer to cook a dinner party for anyone who would host me in their home for a few days and invite their friends. I initially thought that I'd mostly garner interest from friends and acquaintances but quickly learned that strangers also readily took to the idea, probably because it's such an unexpected thing to hear someone say, "I'm driving through all 50 states to host dinner parties and collect stories about who we are as a nation." (I flew to Hawaii and Alaska.) I would do all the shopping and cooking, and my hosts would only need to entertain their friends.

I launched LMF in February of 2016 and had planned for an 18-month journey, both in terms of time and budget. By December, I had completed 28 states and was on schedule. But the 2016 presidential election made the country much more interesting to me, and so in 2017 I slowed down and spent much more time in the internal states. I would return to the same towns and cities where I'd established friendships with my hosts, places that informed me about who we are as a nation in this moment. People were doing the hard work to rebuild their communities in places that had recently gone through great shifts in industry and demographics, and they were finding real solutions.

**Shipmate:** What was it like to plan the trip?

Le: Once I had the pitch for the dinner party concept, I sent a mass email to friends all over the country, just to test it. The replies were overwhelmingly positive. Leaving from San Diego, CA, I wanted to make Blythe the first stop. It's a tiny town on the California-Arizona border that I had passed through many times but never visited. Because I didn't know a soul there, I used the traveler's website CouchSurfing to find my first host. She lived in the middle of the desert just south of the town, in



an enclave of fewer than a dozen of converted mobile homes. Her name was Nancy, and she grew up in Germany and would skip school to spend hours in museums. As an adult, she worked as a yoga instructor on board cruise ships, a chef for a dude ranch and an artist. She had gone to the desert to live for one year to hone her drawing techniques. The first Le Mobile Feast "dinner party" included her neighbor, a half-Cherokee man named John, who told me stories about growing up as the son of an alfalfa farmer in the nearby fields. I knew from that baptismal experience that LMF would introduce me to people and stories I could never find without staying in their homes for days at a time. The real stories would come out when we're standing around the kitchen cooking lunch or making coffee, when I'm not "interviewing" people at the table.

I wanted to keep the itinerary flexible enough to stay longer in one place or to return to another for deeper stories, so the planning forecasted just about one to two weeks at a time. I kept a spreadsheet of contacts that people had given me for future stops, and about three weeks out I would email them with the pitch. In places where I didn't know anyone but knew that I wanted to visit, I used CouchSurfing—about 1/4 of the overall 230-something households.

**Shipmate:** How did the Naval Academy community support your adventure?

Le: From the start, my classmates expressed interest in hosting dinners in their homes, even those I didn't know well back in school. Social media helped a great deal. At the end of 2016, I submitted an update in the "Class News" about reuniting with dozens of classmates, and that inspired even more alumni of various years to reach out. In Nebraska, a 2001 graduate offered to host me. She was a newly arrived plebe when I was her first-set platoon commander, and I hadn't seen her since graduation. Sometime during that academic year, I had given her one of my red detailer name tags to say that she was someone who had grown substantially and to encourage her to keep developing as a leader. During my stay with her and her husband (a 2000 graduate), she showed me that name tag, which by then I had forgotten about. It was a truly special moment, one of many among the reunions I experienced throughout those three years.

# LEAVE NO ONE BEHIND: A SACRED MILITARY TRADITION

Acenturies-old military ethos exists in a warrior's DNA, Leave no one behind. All of us learned that during Plebe Summer and have lived it since. This guiding principle reflects a commitment and responsibility that extends to our comrades who fought for us and helped protect us against mutual enemies. The following story illustrates one of the ways older alumni continue to follow this maxim.

### **CREATING COLLEAGUES**

The United States trained 265 Afghan pilots with the majority selecting helicopters following Operation Enduring Freedom, which launched in October 2001. All trainees were graduates of the National Military Aviation Academy or the Afghan Air Force Academy, commissioned as a first or second lieutenant, and most have college degrees. Selection was based on aptitude and English proficiency. Basic training consisted of intensive English language study followed by ground school and then flight training (via Horizon Air in the UAE under a U.S. Air Force contract with Raytheon). Each received a certificate of completion from Rotary Wing Basic School.

Under another U.S. Air Force contract, the pilots received additional training in Slovakia and were certified as both commercial- and instrument-rated rotary wing pilots, using Night Optical Devices (NODs) in all-glass cockpits.

The pilots returned to Afghanistan and were assigned to operational squadrons. Most saw combat. Others were involved with logistics and supply. Some flew U.S. Special Operations Command (SOCOM) missions in support of the Afghan National Air Force/Army. A few flew with U.S. forces on special operations missions. All flew with honor, courage and at tremendous personal risk. Their combat skills helped save U.S. soldiers' lives and they were greatly feared by the Taliban.

### **AUGUST 2021**

After waging a 20-year war against Al-Qaeda and the Taliban the U.S. pulled out of Afghanistan. Our departure on 30 August 2021 left behind tens of thousands of U.S.-trained Afghan military.

Unbeknownst to the general public, hundreds of veteran-led groups sprang up to help evacuate our Afghan partners and their family members. In particular,

Rear Admiral Tim Flynn '79, USN (Ret.), created the Afghan Refugee Resettlement Group (ARRG). He recruited me for this all-veteran, all-volunteer team, which initially operated under the umbrella of a well-funded nonprofit organization.

### **RESCUE**

In the beginning, our goal was simple: Get our allies into a friendly country as fast as possible. However, simple extraction operations are typically hard. We had to arrange for safe houses, food, medical care, security and transportation—all during the chaos of a new Taliban-controlled Afghanistan. Over the next 90 days we airlifted out 763 souls who eventually arrived in the U.S. by early 2022.

Unfortunately, we left behind eight family members of a SOCOM translator who had been forced to shelter in Kandahar, south of Kabul. It took until 22 December 2022—another harrowing 13 months—to finally get them here.

This 17-month saga was so complex that several books could be written about the experience. Our total resettlement number

We thought that was it. Not so.

### A NEW MISSION

In late February of 2023, an ARRG colleague made a desperate plea for additional assistance from the team. With the withdrawal of





U.S. forces from Afghanistan between April and 30 August of 2021, more than 90 percent of the Afghan pilots and their families were abandoned with no clear path out of peril. Almost all escaped to various locations in Pakistan. Their lives were still in danger because they were enemies of the Taliban and marked to be eliminated as soon as the Taliban took control of the country.

We needed to get the band back together to bring 18 more U.S.-trained Afghan combat helicopter pilots and their 17 family members to the United States. ARRG was back in business. Unfortunately, this time we had no nonprofit umbrella organization and no money. A coalition of flight instructors had been using personal funds to support the group, but those funds would be gone by April. Funding became the critical path.

Once we began again, we had to find a way or make one. A former ARRG colleague and fellow veteran led us to the 2430 Group. This nonprofit (also all-veteran-led) agreed to function as our financial manager. Forging this partnership was huge since it meant we could now widely publicize the plight of this group and take credit card donations. Enabling tax deductible contributions made it easier for donors to make a decision.

As we were a new startup group, we raised seed money from friends and family to support the effort until we got organized. Then we began a two-pronged

campaign, 1) immediately ramping up resettlement efforts with the Department of State to process all 35 refugees (now 36 with the recent birth of a baby), and 2) creation, development and broad circulation of a very compelling story to accelerate fundraising.

# **RESETTLEMENT VIA "HUMANITARIAN PAROLE"**

The United States has a program called Humanitarian Parole (P-1) for individuals who are at risk in their home countries and wish to resettle in the U.S. It is a complex and time-consuming process for those seeking immigration here. There are many steps involved but, simply put, those requesting this permission must, 1) get recognized as a qualifying applicant; 2) undergo a background check; 3) be interviewed by the United Nations' International Office of Migration; 4) sit for a detailed interview (to include all members of the family) with the United States Customs and Immigration Service (USCIS); and then, 5) everyone in the family must pass a medical exam. After successful completion of all this, clearance is eventually given for travel to the U.S.

This process is even more challenging in Pakistan, where there are more than 25,000 Afghan humanitarian parole applications in place for resettlement to the United States. On a daily basis, ARRG tracks the pilots' progress, guides them through the steps and keeps connected with senior officials in the State Department and DoD. Even all this effort does not speed up the system.

As of late November 2023, all the pilots were working through the steps and several were almost finished, but our best estimate is that it could take another six to nine months before these comrades and their loved ones can travel to the United States.

We have secured a commitment at 50 percent—the going rate from a national law firm for immigration support through permanent residency once the families reach the U.S. We are

actively working with helicopter associations representing operators who need pilots since the U.S. is short about 2,000 helo pilots. All the pilots want to fly again. They will have to recertify and build hours, but they are combat-trained and will not be starting from scratch. And they will become dedicated employees and loyal citizens.

### **FUNDING OPERATIONS**

We estimated a total need of at least \$240,000 to meet financial goals for our Afghan friends. The word "goals" translates to achieving permanent residency in the U.S. and employment. This includes Pakistan subsistence costs (rent, utilities, food, medical care and incidentals, plus keeping the pilots and their families safe), resident country document processing fees, travel, immigration fees for resettlement to permanent residency and initial support (including help finding employment) when they reach the U.S.

For example, a new visa can cost as much as \$5,000 ... more than half needed one. It costs \$5,200 per month to support our 36 friends in exile. This includes housing, food and everything in between. These folks have now been isolated in Pakistan since August of 2021.

# BROADLY TELLING OUR STORY— THE REACH OF YOUTUBE

Commander Ward Carroll '82, USN (Ret.), a retired Navy F–14 radar intercept officer, provided our next breakthrough. After he retired, Carroll served as an embedded journalist with the 101st Airborne Division when he was with Military.com and was acutely aware of the humanitarian disaster caused by our abrupt departure.

Carroll is a published author (the *Punk's War* series), worked for USNI and then became a widely respected YouTube producer. He creates video segments of interest about all things associated with flying, current events, and human interest, and then publishes these videos on his YouTube channel. He has more than 500,000 subscribers and eagerly agreed to assist us by producing a segment on these 18 Afghan helo pilots, our efforts to get them to the U.S. and the urgent need for funding.

During the segment, which went live on 2 August, Carroll interviewed the head flight instructor (a retired Army CW-4 helo pilot who completed one tour in Afghanistan), two of the Afghan helo pilots and Tim Flynn. When he published the video titled "Trapped—Pilots who fought terrorists are now being hunted," Carroll created closed captions for the conversation with the two Afghan pilots since they used fake names and wore masks and sunglasses to shield their identities.

Carroll's segment generated 91,000 views and more than \$30,000 in donations.

# **ACADEMY ALUMNI**

Good fortune arrived again when the Class of 1969 formally endorsed ARRG's efforts. This led to broader awareness in the class and significant participation. News of the project continued to spread and has resulted in support from the USNA Alumni Association Colorado chapter (under the encouragement of Captain Guy Higgins '69, USN (Ret.), a 23rd Company classmate). Bob Miller '70 stepped up and posted the link on the Class of 1970's Facebook page and the Alumni Association's Cincinnati chapter circulated a message to all of our local members.

### WHERE WE STAND NOW

We are almost halfway to our financial target. All funds raised are used only for the stated expenses. Interestingly, 70 percent of the funds are from veterans and of those, 80 percent Navy or Naval Academy sources.

Collectively, ARRG team members have contributed more than 7,000 hours to bring these loyal comrades to the U.S. We take no money for our time or expenses, and we have no intention of stopping until all members of this group are safely in the U.S.

he U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation (USNA AA&F) is committed to serving members throughout their life's journey. A central piece of this sacred mission is honoring alumni who exemplify the values instilled in them at the Academy.

The USNA AA&F's legacy programs team is dedicated to sharing the stories of alumni who made the ultimate sacrifice in service to their country, made meaningful contributions during their time in or out of uniform or have had a profound impact on the Academy.

The legacy programs team recently discussed the importance of why and how we share the stories and honor the members of the U.S. Naval Academy community.

Captain Wes Huey '87, USN (Ret.), executive director of Strategy and Legacy Programs and Gwenn Dennis, director of

The USNA Alumni Association & Foundation hosts an annual Honor Our Fallen Heroes event. Alumni are encouraged to serve as escorts for the families of the fallen during this event.

Legacy Programs and Memorial Services, are evaluating how to best support the Naval Academy alumni community and their families. Their team organized the largest Honor Our Fallen Heroes ceremony in November 2023 and continue to plan the 26th Distinguished Graduate Award ceremony scheduled for March.

Shipmate: What does legacy mean to you?

Dennis: Legacy to me is heritage. The legacy part of our program is meant to be the part that celebrates the lives and the actions of our alumni who have gone out and done great things, whether that's acted heroically in battle or perhaps sacrificed their lives in the service of their country. If we're looking at something like Honor Our Fallen, which is one of my passions, it's to connect those families back to the person that they lost—to keep them engaged and, hopefully, volunteering, reaching out and helping us find more of the families of our fallen in order to make our program even larger and stronger than what it already is.

Huey: Many of our alumni choose to make a philanthropic contribution to the community—to the Naval Academy—for that purpose. It's meaningful to them whether it's time, talent or treasure. But to me, it just comes back to honor, courage and commitment. You honor those values through the legacy programs. You honor those who have fallen serving their country. You honor those who have done amazing things—those who have courage to serve in the first place.

Going to the Naval Academy, signing up as a leader—that's not something that a lot of college students decide to do. The commitment to make sure that alumni are cared for throughout their lives is really an embodiment of the honor, courage and commitment that is instilled in us from day one at the Naval Academy.

**Shipmate:** What impact does legacy have on the Academy and its alumni as a result of sharing and recognizing these members of the alumni community?

**Huey:** About a year ago, we embarked on a process to write a new strategic plan for the next 10 years that we called Strategic Plan 2030. One of the elements of that strategic plan was to provide the support that our alumni have come to expect over the many years that we've been doing this, but especially over the last several years, where we've become a little bit more sophisticated in the way that we think about what alumni need.

Our Naval Academy is founded on the principle that we accomplish the mission together. None of us do it alone. At the Alumni Association, we seek to carry that ethos into how we accomplish our mission. The legacy part of our organization is meant to be the part that celebrates the lives and the actions of our alumni in the service of their country.

We believe that when we do that, we reinforce for each other and for the rest of our alumni what it means to be a graduate of the Naval Academy. We honor those folks so that we can all take part in this sense of shared purpose and value through the lives that these individuals have lived that are worth recognizing and honoring. To some extent, that helps us all reinforce what we all believe are our shared values.

It's not very difficult for most Naval Academy alumni when they look back on what's been important in their life. For me, much of this has to do with my service and time on active duty. My best friends are the folks that I went to school with, the folks that I served with. Working here at the Alumni Association, I get to participate in the act of putting these individuals in environments in which they can share that connection and celebrate it.

Shipmate: How can alumni get involved with legacy programs?

**Huey:** One way alumni can get involved in this program is to serve as escorts for family members during our Honor Our Fallen Heroes event. We have about 30 families that are coming back. The alumni who were killed in action—it's their roommates and their teammates who are coming back to serve as escorts for those family members. These programs are also a great mechanism through which alumni can reconnect.

**Shipmate:** Where would you like to see legacy programs go in the future and what can alumni community members anticipate seeing in the next few years?

**Dennis:** We have a growth vision for the legacy program, just like we have for all of our other programs. We will see growth in terms of one of our strategic pillars—to be supportive of our alumni community. We'd like to see members that are at every stage of their lives being engaged with us.

**Huey:** Someone asked me the other day where we're trying to be 10 years from now. How do we know that we've achieved what we're trying to achieve? I think it's pretty simple. An alumnus wakes up one day and says, "I have a question about X" and the first place that they turn to ask that question is the Alumni Association.

Our strategic plan is targeted specifically to ensure that we make opportunities available to alumni across that lifespan. In 10 years, the legacy programs will reach out and touch more and more of those alumni. We are also envisioning growth in terms of the kinds of recognition that we provide to the alumni community. We're going beyond the Distinguished Graduate Award to identify volunteer leaders that are out there doing great things for parent clubs, for shared interest groups (SIGs), for chapters and for classes.

Now before you go getting your back up about not being a hero, you

need to hear me out. This wasn't some ridiculous performative display meant to draw more attention to the participants than those remembered ... neither one of us ever cared for that stuff. This was a quiet, modest ceremony in which we all had the opportunity to reflect on what it means to serve. So just shut up and listen, will va?

I know how hard it was to walk out the door in uniform, leaving our families behind so we could do our duty to our country and mankind. The agonizing what-ifs swirled through our heads as we strapped on our gear, be it a ship, submarine, airplane, rifle or even a desk. We always did it, though, because we knew if the worst came to be, our families would be taken care of by the people we trusted with our own lives.

I gotta tell you, buddy, your family is awesome. I was a little surprised to see none of them had that flaming red hair of yours, but they all had that jokester glint in their eyes coupled with a sense of commitment and fortitude you always showed. Despite losing you at such incredibly young ages, your kids have grown up to be successful and well-adjusted. Your son is even pursuing his own application to the Naval Academy. Man, you should be so proud.

Your wife? Talk about a better half. She has resolve and dignity I don't know I've ever seen before. She soldiered on, raising three incredible kids while dealing with your loss. You chose well, my friend. She is an absolutely amazing person. Get this, after I broke down walking out of Memorial Hall she actually reached out a hand and asked ME if I was okay. And I'M supposed to be comforting HER!

Your family is resilient, but your memory is still fresh with them. They shared stories about you with me and I told them as much about you as I thought you would let me ... The weight on my shoulders that day was immense, because I know you are a good man and it was absolutely imperative to me for them to know that as well. Not to worry, my friend, they already knew.

I'll let you go, brother. I miss singing in the Glee Club with you. I miss that laugh and I miss that smile. I miss sharing stories about Louisiana with you. Your legacy, and the person you were, lives on in your family. So, whatever you are doing now, you should be proud.

# **SACC LAUNCHING NEW INITIATIVES IN 2024**

Since 1994, SACC has hosted nearly 40,000 alumni from the five service academies. SACC is designed to connect high-caliber job candidates, many of whom are transitioning out of military service, with businesses eager to tap into the unique skill sets of service academy alumni.

The Service Academy Career Conference (SACC) continues to incorporate innovative ways to assist job seekers as it celebrates 30 years of helping connect uniquely skilled applicants with elite employers.



In 2024, SACC will reach the 100-conference milestone while making first time appearances in Atlanta, GA (8-9 February), and in Chicago, IL (9-10 May). SACC includes the participation from five service academies, Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, Merchant Marine and the Naval Academy. This year also brings new offerings and support services to job seekers. They include:

- Working with MOAA—Military Officer Association of America on a video highlighting resumé best practices.
- Using AI generated resumé and interview tool Hiration to help candidates prepare for future events.
- A webinar series for both candidates and companies on how to get the most out of your SACC experience.

Commander Mike Lowe '98, USN (Ret.), joined the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association and Foundation in August 2023 as director of alumni support services. He serves as SACC's executive director.

Lowe said one of his priorities is helping applicants navigate the SACC process and maximizing their experience during and after the conference. He said many first-time participants don't know how to best differentiate themselves from the other 400-plus candidates.

"It's a little bit overwhelming," Lowe said. "We're going to be doing all kinds of things before the first event in Atlanta to help everyone get the most out of their experience."

Starting in 1994, SACC has welcomed nearly 40,000 alumni from all five service academies. More than 7,000 companies have attended SACC events in the first 30 years. Lowe said SACC's mission is to assist service academy graduates whether it's transitioning to the civilian sector or starting a new chapter in their careers.

"We want to have career programs that start from the day an Academy alumnus graduates and goes all the way through until they retire," Lowe said. "SACC does a really good job fulfilling the first part of that journey. It's excellent for those lieutenants and lieutenant commanders who are getting out and looking to enter the workforce for the first time."

SACC attracts high-quality firms, large and small, seeking prospective employees with cutting edge technology skills and leadership qualities that service academies produce. Those businesses include Bank of America, Deloitte, Lockheed Martin, Wells Fargo, Lowe's,

SACC is held four times annually. In addition to Washington, DC, and San Diego, CA, SACC will host employers and job seekers in Atlanta, GA, and Chicago, IL, this year. Over the past 30 years, more than 7,000 companies have attended SACC events such as this one in Dallas, TX, in November 2023.

BASF, IBM, CBRE, Microsoft, Meta, KPMG, Goldman Sachs, Ecolab, USAA and Tesla.

"One of the great things all the companies love about SACC is they know the talent that they're getting," Lowe said. "They know the quality of the candidate that's coming there regardless of whether someone has spent three to five years in the military or they spent 15 to 20."

### **FACETIME**

One key benefit to SACC is a social event on Thursday evenings in which candidates and corporate representatives can connect in a relaxed atmosphere. Lowe said this forum is a great avenue for candidates to make an impression that goes well beyond a resumé.

"Share a beverage with them and talk to them in a social environment," Lowe said. "You don't get that at every career conference. Companies have told me they've interviewed and hired folks based on the conversations they've had with them at the social.

"If it was just a resumé, they probably would never have had a conversation with them. It really does come down to selling yourself."

SACC can also be a valuable experience for active-duty members who expect to enter the civilian workforce in the next few years.

"I tell folks, 'you need to go there and learn to take advantage of the networking opportunities," Lowe said. "Even if you're just starting to contemplate entering the civilian community, it's worth your time to go to SACC. Start early because you're going to learn a lot in the process.

"You're going to learn about networking. You need to get on top of that immediately and start connecting with folks in the civilian sector to find out the culture of the places you might want to work."

These face-to-face interactions coupled with formal interviews help applicants pitch strengths their resumés might not spotlight. Lowe said it's a myth that resumés are the pivotal piece to landing a job.

"You need to work toward it being really good but nothing beats being able to have a solid conversation with a recruiter to explain what you can bring to the team," Lowe said. "(Resumés) need to get through the automated system for skills matching. There are lots of things that will do to help that, but 80 to 85 percent of all jobs right now are found through networking.

"The reason I think SACC is special is because it gives you an opportunity to talk to every one of those companies."

Lowe encourages applicants to inventory and prioritize the values important to them.

It's crucial to determine what is important to you whether it's geographic location, life-work balance, a spouse's job or schools, Lowe said.

"Really take some time to think about what you value," Lowe said. "Make sure the companies you talk to share those values. Every service academy graduate has really strong feelings about the things they value or they wouldn't have gone to those institutions. You need to come up with a complete package to be truthful to yourself about what fits and what doesn't."

### Ingar Grev'89



Serving the Naval Academy and our alumni community has been Ingar Grev's passion for decades; arguably, his engagement with the community defines who he is. Grev started coordinating the Class of '89 tailgaters around the mid-90s, and a few years later—in 1999—he was elected as class president. In 2007—during his second term as class president—Grev was asked to join the USNAAA Board of Trustees as

the '80s Decade Representative, where he served for two terms.

While on the Board of Trustees, Grev served on the

Communications, Joint Investment, CEO Transition and CEO

Search Committees. He also was one of the Board's representatives to the Naval Academy Memorial Oversight Committee.

Grev was re-elected for a total of four terms (20 years) as class president and was excluded from running for a fifth term in 2019 due to term limits. After leaving the '89 Board in 2020, he continued to coordinate the '89 tailgaters, administer the '89 social media platforms/website, and chair/participate on three '89 Distinguished Graduate Award committees. Grev returned to the '89 Board of Directors in 2023, and he has been a member of the Navy Football Brotherhood since its founding.

The son of a German World War II POW and a German refugee, Grev entered the Naval Academy from New Jersey, earning a B.S. in systems engineering in 1989. Before serving as a submarine officer in Philadelphia, he was a coach for the 10-0 1989 NAPS football team. After completing his submarine tour at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in 1994, Grev reported back to the Academy to

work in the physical education department as a staff member, instructor and lightweight football coach (now called sprint football). During that tour, he also earned an MS in systems engineering at the University of Maryland. A few years later, Grev returned to the University of Maryland to earn his MBA.

Grev left the Navy in 1996 and settled in the Annapolis area. His first job out of the Navy was with Verizon (back then called Bell Atlantic), and since then his career went in several directions, from telecommunications to defense contracting, from very large companies to small, and from corporate to entrepreneurial. After leaving Verizon, he worked for a small defense contractor supporting the National Missile Defense program. He returned to telecommunications a few years later to work with the startup Covad Communications. When the telecom market crashed in 2003, he returned to the defense industry for a company that was acquired by Raytheon, and for about eight more years he supported the Missile Defense Agency as a technology leader/ systems engineer. Grev started his own company around 2011, where he provided strategic advisory services, interim executive support and business development consulting. During that time Grev was also a nationally read contributor to The Business Journals. From 2017-2022, Grev was the Navy business development executive for 3M, and is currently the director of Defense Business Development for Motion and Flow Control Products Inc.

### Jim "JJ" Brennan '84



Jim "JJ" Brennan '84 has called the West Coast home for more than 84 percent of his time since graduating from the Naval Academy including living in San Diego, CA, Seattle, WA, and, since 1995, Fremont, CA. His military career kicked off with NAPS and USNA followed by surface warfare division officer and department head tours in STEIN and ACADIA respectively, with a stint as a staff officer at the Naval Academy in between.

Transitioning into a sales and marketing career upon leaving active duty, Brennan has had key leadership positions in several industries and companies: Specialty Chemical (Nalco), Commercial Solar (Jabil, D2Solar, Borrego Solar, NRG, Stion) and, primarily,

Semiconductor Capital Equipment (Applied Materials, Eugenus, UCT, Ichor Systems). Following his initial transition from active duty, he also served as a reserve staff officer on COMCARGRU THREE (INDEPENDENCE/Whidbey Island) and COMCARGRU FIVE (ABRAHAM LINCOLN/Moffett Field).

Graduating from the Academy with a B.S. in marine engineering, Brennan has also completed the Strategic Marketing Executive Education course at Stanford University's Graduate School of Business.

His enjoyment of serving graduates took off after moving to the Bay Area when he became involved in the Silicon Valley Business Network, an organization of 500 grads from all service academies (about half from Navy) around the greater San Francisco Bay Area founded in the early '90s by Raymond Burkley '60. ### Captain Kennon "Pat" Temple '79, USNR (Ret.)



Captain Kennon "Pat" Temple '79, USNR (Ret.), has enjoyed a career spanning more than five decades marked by servant leadership and grounded in service to his nation and community. More than 25 years of both active and Reserve service, Temple's character and spirit were forged by his time in the Navy, beginning at Annapolis.

His career began as a naval aviator flying the S-3 Viking, with follow-on aviation

tours as a flight instructor in the Fleet Replacement Squadron (FRS) for the S-3 and special projects, in both active and Reserve roles. Temple expanded his knowledge base into command and staff positions of increasing responsibility, ultimately being selected to serve as commanding officer of three reserve units, notably in support roles for major Joint Commands. Retiring as a captain from the Navy Reserve in 2004, Temple's final command was a Navy Reserve unit tasked with supporting emergent requirements for the staffs of NATO Headquarters in both Norfolk and Brussels.

In 1987, Temple transitioned from active duty to the Navy Reserve and civilian employment as a pilot for Delta Air Lines. For the next 35 years, Temple flew all over the world, and qualified as a captain on numerous transoceanic aircraft. He was designated as a Federal Aviation Administration line check airman, responsible for the training and supervision of hundreds of new pilots. Additionally, since 2002 he volunteered significant time and effort on behalf of the Air Line Pilot Association (ALPA), both as a safety volunteer and Critical Incident Response Program (CIRP) committee member.

Temple eventually served as vice chairman and then chairman of the CIRP team until retiring from Delta. In this capacity, he chaired an extraordinary committee of volunteers, trained in stress management and support for more than 12,000 Delta

pilots in the event of a mishap or operational incident. Finally, he volunteered and was deputized as a Department of Homeland Security, Transportation Security Administration federal flight deck officer from 2004 until 2022. In recognition of extensive service to aviation security, Temple was awarded the President of the United States Volunteer Service Award from the TSA.

Temple's military affiliations include, United States Naval Academy Alumni Association—Life Member, Colorado chapter. U.S. Naval Academy Blue & Gold Officer from 1991 to the present, supporting multiple high schools, first in North Central Texas, then in Evergreen, CO, and surrounding communities. As a member of the Rocky Mountain Naval Reserve Association in the early 2000s, Temple joined a team of Flag-level and other senior officers who traveled the U.S. teaching fitness report structure, grading and promotion cycles. This rewarding and impactful project added value for many hundreds of Naval Reservists. As a member of the Navy League of the United States, Temple is an active promoter of regional events. He is a life member of the American Legion and current commander of Evergreen Post 2001.

In civilian life, Temple serves as an elected official in his fifth consecutive term as director and secretary on the board of directors of the West Jefferson County Metropolitan District. He was a former Boy Scouts of America local troop adult leader and council adult education instructor for more than ten years. He has served for more than three decades as a volunteer for Ducks Unlimited International as local committee member, chapter treasurer and most recently as Evergreen Colorado Committee Area chairman.





Originating about 25 years ago as a group narrowly focused on communications and interaction among local alumni-owned businesses, the Hampton Roads Chapter Business Development Group has evolved into something considerably more forward-leaning that today engages alumni from all service academies and encourages participation from like-minded alumni and groups outside the Hampton Roads area.

Since 2021 this group, guided by Meeting Facilitator **Rob Hanckel** '78, has hosted combined virtual and in-person breakfast meetings on the first Wednesday of each month for those already in business, contemplating starting a new business endeavor, or looking for employment. This networking forum actively fosters insightful dialogue and informative conversations; and at each meeting the participants can state business needs, offer mutual assistance, and share job opportunities in a collegial, round-table format. The hybrid format allows participants to join remotely or meet in person at a local venue to enjoy sponsored coffee and breakfast.

In 2023 the meetings began including an educational "BizNetwork Tips" component. These 10- to 20-minute Q & A sessions cover topics of interest to businesspersons and entrepreneurs. For those who are not early risers, and to further promote growth and development, the program includes occasional business networking Happy Hours and periodically focuses on alumni-supported non-profit and philanthropic organizations.

The BizDev Group believes that in today's world of virtual work and remote meetings geographic constraints can be minimized to promote nationwide participation and advancement of alumni entrepreneurs and businesspersons eager to identify new opportunities and drive them toward success.



LAWRENCE CLOYD BALDWIN '46

Commander "Larry" Baldwin, USN (Ret.), 98, passed away peacefully at home on 20 October 2023.

Larry and his twin brother, James Lloyd, were born to Ressa and Dr. Clifford Baldwin of Sumner, IL, on 15 November 1924. Larry's deep roots in rural southern Illinois remained strong his entire life. His father, a dentist, and his mother, a teacher and State Committeewoman

active in local politics, instilled strong values of service, compassion and loyalty. In 1942, at age 17, Larry's scholastic accomplishments earned him an appointment to the Naval Academy.

His wartime-accelerated class graduated in three years, after which Larry and most classmates deployed to the Pacific as World War II was ending. Post war, Larry went on to earn graduate degrees from the Naval Postgraduate School and CalTech. He had a distinguished 20-year career

as a naval aviator, logging thousands of hours in the cockpits of many different aircraft, flying most from aircraft carriers in the Atlantic and the Mediterranean. During the Cuban Missile Crisis, Larry was part of the successful naval action that kept Soviet nuclear missiles out of Cuba. He was a test pilot at Patuxent River NATC when his naval career came to a close, having transitioned from iconic World War II propellor-driven planes, to cold-war era jets, to supersonic aircraft.

Retiring from the Navy in 1965, Larry continued flying as a test pilot for Martin Marietta. Following that, he consulted for years with the Navy and other DOD agencies.

Larry left the workforce at last, but never really stopped working. An interest in geology led him to volunteer many years with the U.S. Geologic Survey. He spent countless hours active in local politics and at age 87 was awarded Member of the Year by the Fairfax County Democratic Committee. He'd previously served a term as a Fairfax County Planning Commissioner and was instrumental in creating the Centreville (VA) Historic District. His desire to leave the world a better place inspired him at 93 to write a book explaining climate change. It also sparked an interest in hydrogen fuel cells as an alternative to carbon. He started a company to explore markets for this technology.

Larry is survived by his children, Marilyn (Tom), Robert (Margaret) and Steven (Beth); nephew, James; eight grandchildren; and nine greatgrandchildren. He was predeceased by his beloved wife of 66 years, Mary, and his brother, Lloyd.

Larry was interred at St. John's Episcopal Church in Centreville, VA. ★



#### PETER SCOTT SWANSON '49

Captain Peter S. Swanson, USN (Ret.), passed away on 10 March 2023.

"Pete" was born in Pocatello, ID, in 1926. It should be said that from an early age, Pete loved a good joke and his sense of humor stayed intact for 96 years. Here is the rest of his story:

After graduating from Pocatello High School (1944), he joined the Navy V-12 program. He was

assigned to the unit at ISU and during the year there, he received an appointment from Senator Henry Dworshak to the Naval Academy.

After graduating with the Class of 1949, he went into flight training, earning his Wings in 1950 as an attack pilot. Pete served two combat tours aboard Philippine Sea and Kearsarge. While flying combat missions as a bomber pilot in the Korean Conflict, he was shot down twice by enemy fire.

Upon his return Stateside, fortunate circumstances brought Pete together with his childhood schoolmate, DeEtte Bryan. They fell in love and married in 1953. As Navy life unfolded, they had three wonderful children.

Pete's orders took him to several posts, subsequent duty stations included: teaching math at USNA; serving in the Joint Search and Rescue Center in Pearl Harbor, HI; officer-in-charge of the Atlantic Fleet's Nuclear Warfare School in Oceana, VA; strike warfare officer, then navigator of ENTERPRISE (CVN-65); graduated with distinction at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA, earning a master's degree in Computer Systems Management; head of the Aviation Statistics Branch on the staff of the Chief of Naval Operations; and CO, Naval Command Systems Support, Washington, DC.

His personal decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal (3), Air Medal (2), Navy Commendation Medal (3) and the Vietnam Meritorious Unit Gallantry Cross Award.

After retirement from the Navy in 1976, Pete worked with various national security defense corporations, retiring from Computer Sciences Corporation in March 1993.

In his golden years, he and DeEtte traveled far and wide to Europe, the Caribbean and enjoyed family time at the Outer Banks of North Carolina, Seattle WA, and Shenandoah National Park along with duties as USNA Class of 1949 treasurer.

Predeceased by his beloved DeEtte in 2015, Pete is survived by their three children (and spouses), Kathleen Smith (Bert) of Silverdale, WA, Carrie Edwards (Steve) of Midlothian, VA, and Peter JB Swanson of Centreville VA; five grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

#### MARK PERRIN FRUDDEN '50

Rear Admiral Mark P. Frudden, USN (Ret.), died of natural causes at his home in San Diego, CA, on 9 January 2023. He was 95 years old.

Mark was born in Greene, IA. He attended Western Military Academy and Iowa State College before entering the Naval Academy as a member of the Ninth Company.

Following graduation with the Class of 1950, he was assigned to the destroyer George K.

MACKENZIE and immediately deployed to Korea. He subsequently served in LST-1080, LSMR-527, the heavy cruiser Toledo, destroyer Wilkinson and the guided missile cruiser LITTLE ROCK. He served as commanding officer of the fleet tug Quapaw, destroyer escort Charles Berry, guided missile destroyer LAWRENCE and the guided missile cruiser GRIDLEY.

Assignments ashore included aide to Commander Puget Sound Naval Shipyard; Bureau of Naval Personnel; aide and flag secretary to Commander in Chief Pacific Fleet; and during the Vietnam War, Assistant Chief of Staff for Plans to Commander Naval Forces Vietnam.

Promoted to rear admiral in 1975, his first flag assignment was as Commander Naval Forces Korea with additional duty as Senior Member, Military Armistice Commission for the United Nations Command. Following a crisis precipitated by North Korea by their brutal murder of two U.S. Army officers at Panmunjom, in a series of meetings, Mark delivered the protest to Kim II Sung, articulated the position and demands of the U.S. government and participated in the negotiation of new security arrangements for the area.

From 1977-1979, he served in Plans Directorate of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Washington, DC. His last assignment prior to retirement in 1980, was as Commander Naval Surface Group, Western Pacific and Commander Task Force 73, Subic Bay, Philippines.

Admiral Frudden attended the Naval War College Command and Staff Course, the National War College, received an MS in International Affairs from The George Washington University and an MBA from the University of Iowa.

Captain Robert G. Donnelly, USN (Ret.), passed away on 24 November 2023.

Born on 16 April 1929 in San Diego, CA, "Bob" graduated from St. Augustine High School, San Diego (1947), enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve Platoon Leaders Program (1948) and graduated from the Naval Academy (1949). He was USN liaison with the French and German navies for diving and salvage matters and was the USN representative with the French during their experimental dive to 2,000 feet.

Bob's last duty assignment was with the U.S. Naval Inspector General, Washington,  $\mathsf{DC}$ .

He retired from the Navy in 1978 and joined the Enterprise Engine Division of Transamerica Corporation (San Francisco), retiring in 1992 and returning permanently to San Diego in 1995.

Captain "Ron" Fisher, USN (Ret.) of Arlington, VA, passed away peacefully on 31 October 2023 after a courageous battle with cardiac and pulmonary disease.

After "retiring" Ron continued to develop his extensive experience in engineering, management, logistics, education and training, as well as the judicial system. He launched the Defense Fire Protection Association (DFPA), a scientific research and educational foundation dedicated to improving the safety and survivability of our military forces. He served as a volunteer at Unitarian Universalist Church of Arlington (VA), with youth sports organizations, and he ran for political office at both the state and federal levels.
